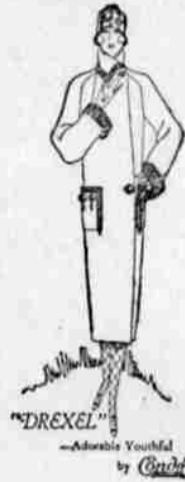

CHAMBERLAIN SAYS SALE TO DOLLAR IS NATIONAL BLUNDER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, April 1.—Representatives of the Pacific Mail Steamship line discussed here today the situation confronting the company in view of the acceptance by the shipping board of the bid of the Dollar interest for its ships and service in the California-Orient line.

Participating in the conference were Gale H. Carter, president of the Pacific Mail; New York counsel for the company and former Senator George E. Chamberlain of Oregon, who represented the Pacific Mail in the negotiations with the board.

No statement was forthcoming nor was any light thrown on reports that some action to defer consummation of sale might be taken, possibly through injunction proceedings.

R. Stanley Dollar, vice-president of the Dollar lines remained here to take up through counsel for the shipping board the drafting of a sale contract which might go before the board for final approval. The Dollar interests were awarded the California-Orient line yesterday on their purchase bid by a four to three vote of the shipping board, which as a climax to a long series of discussions and open hearings at which warning was given of what was viewed as a monopolistic trend in shipping on the Pacific coast. The line involved in the sale with its five combination passenger and cargo ships of the President type running out of San Francisco, for more than four years has been operated for the board by the Pacific Mail, which in taking over that service eliminated its line to the Orient established in 1917.

By the purchase the Dollar interests will take over another line to the Orient in addition to the five vessels of the President type. They already are operating for the shipping board from Seattle to the Orient, as well as the vessels in that trade in its around-the-world service.

The Dollar bid was for \$5,625,000 in cash, whereas the Pacific Mail made a bid of \$6,750,000, part in cash and part carried in a stock preferred payment provision which was held illegal by the counsel for the shipping board.

The discussions surrounding the sale involved questions of public policy as well as of law and finance and brought from sides, after announcement of the award, a flood of statements that broke a tight silence provisionally maintained by all concerned for weeks.

Acceptance of the Dollar bid was supported by Chairman O'Connor and Commissioner's Lissner, Haney and Hill and was opposed by Vice-chairman Plummer and Commissioner Thompson and Benson. A statement placed in the minutes of the board by the minority set forth their reasons for opposing the sale on grounds of both public policy and business considerations; while a majority declared acceptance of the Dollar bid was sound in public policy, law and good business practice.

Former Senator George E. Chamberlain, said in a statement: "The fact that three out of seven members of the shipping board bitterly opposed the Dollar bid and have denounced it as a violation of the Jones Act is sufficient evidence that a national blunder will be committed if the sale goes through. The Jones act does not oblige the board to sell and specifically enjoins the board to consider the national defense and the permanent maintenance of steamship service when it does sell. The acceptance of the Dollar bid is a heavy blow to the national defense, because it sells out of government hands, subject to only a five year guarantee of maintenance of service, five small number of American ships fast enough for naval auxiliary ships. The terms and conditions of this bid impose no obligations upon the buyer to keep in the trans-Pacific service after five years and it is open to grave doubt that the obligation for service even that long is binding under the proposed contract."

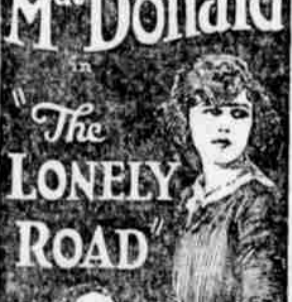
