BRONZE COFFIN WAS TOO SHABBY FOR CHINESE PRES.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

PEKING, Apr. 2.—The last wish of the late Dr. Sun Yat-sen, first president of the Chinese republic that he be buried in a bronze casket, went unfulfilled today. The bronze casket long awaited from Moscow, arrived and proved to be a shabby affair, unsuitable, and was rejected.

Tonight Dr. Sun's body lies in the Western hills at Peking, nine miles from the city, in celestial Elyuansu temple. It will be removed later to Nanking the city in which Dr. Sun first ruled as president.

The funeral ceremony today was a throwback to Manchu manners and customs.

From Central Park where the body of the progressive Chinese leader has been laid out since his death, the services began. A touch of occidental ways was seen in the glass casket in which Dr. Sun was encased, while countless Chinese admirers gazed upon his face.

Thousands of scrolls extolling Dr. Sun's virtues were hung from the walls of the mortuary chamber and adjoining temporary structures which also housed hundreds of artificial wreaths and emblems.

The funeral was attended by a huge crowd. The body was carried to the gates of Central Park where the procession of mourners were carried by vehicles to the spot in the western hills where China's idealist was laid away.

LONDON, Apr. 2.—Vice-Admiral Sir Michael Cume Seymour, second sea Lord and chief of naval personnel, died today. He was born August 29, 1867, the son of the third Baronet, Sir M. Cume Seymour. Sir Michael served as a rear-admiral in the battle of Jutland, commanded the Black sea and Caspian squadrons in 1919 and was commander in chief of the North American and West Indies station from 1923 to 1924.
