COUNTY TRAFFIC OFFICE CUT OFF BY COUNTY COURT

The county court today discontinued the office of county traffic cop, a position held since the first of the year by Deputy Sheriff E. E. Leas of Oakland. The office was created the first of the year and was tried as an experiment until today, when the county court revoked an order discontinuing the office. It is stated by the county court that although Mr. Leas brought in as much in fines as the cost of maintaining the service, that it was necessary to pay his salary and expenses out of the general fund of the county, while the money received from fines went into the road fund leaving the general fund short the amount paid out. As no provision was made in the general fund for such payments, at the time the budget was adopted, the court states that the funds are not available to keep the officer employed. The state was given the power by the recent legislature to employ more traffic cops, the court states, and two more can be supplied Douglas County if the conditions justify.

NEW YORK, Apr. 3.—Fish that flirt and climb trees, monkeys that brush their teeth after every meal and birds that sleep upside down are a few of the animals described last night by Carveth Wells, F. R. G. S. explorer in a lecture reciting six years of adventure in the jungles of the Malay Peninsula.

The tree climbing fish comes out of the water to play on the beach. "When you tickle its tummy it swells up with air and bounces about for sheer happiness," said Mr. Wells.

Another funny freak is the flirting fish, the only swimming animal known to have a genuine wink. This coquettish creature is known as the periphatthalmus schlosseri, which is Greek for eye winker.

Mr. Wells told of a live Teddy bear 16 inches high and looking when full grown precisely like the toy.

Even smaller is the yeast pocket deer, which measured seven inches from hoof to horn. There is a plant so sensitive that it flattens itself against the ground when one stamps near it, but yet so strong that it resists the fiercest typhoons.

There is the hygienic monkey, so careful of his health that after every meal and before going to bed at night, he repairs to the nearest stream and brushes his teeth with the aid of the first finger of the right hand.

There is the bird which sleeps upside down.

"But then," Mr. Wells concluded, "everything is upside down in the Malay jungle."

FLITTING SHADOWS AT SUN'S ECLIPSE CAUGHT BY CAMERA

TUCSON, Ariz., April 3.—Photographs of the shadow bands on the sun during the recent total eclipse, were made successfully in the east with an apparatus designed and built by Dr. A. E. Douglass, director of the Seward Observatory here. The Arizona astronomer recently received the first prints from exposures made by his shadow-band camera, used at Middletown Conn., under the supervision of Dr. H. T. Stetson, head of the astronomical department at Harvard.

At the time the exposures were made weather condition was perfect. The temperature was four below zero. As the recording of these shadow bands, a source of mystification to leading authorities, had never been achieved successfully in previous eclipses, the present attainment is regarded important to science. Dr. Douglass says the experiment proves beyond doubt that the waves are caused by irregularities in the density of atmosphere, a theory he has held for many years.

The prints show the shadow-bands distinctly. They were rendered visible to the camera lens by the smallness of the sun's crescent. The pictures were taken during the minute preceding and the minute following totality of the eclipse. Dr. Douglass points out that the same effect is seen from distant electric lights and on stars viewed through a strong telescope.

The photographic outfit consists of a 13-inch convex mirror, focusing a beam of light through a small opening on to a film six inches beyond the focus. This concentrated light and enormously increased the contrast, thus bringing out in prominence these very faint shadows.

EDENBOWER PAVING TO BE EXTENDED

The Edenbower paving job will be extended 525 feet, the mark originally fixed for the improvement, the county court announced today. As the amount of money available for this job is approximately \$12,000, the court in advertising for bids called for proposals for paving about three-fourths of a mile, with the provision that the pavement could be extended at the same unit prices. The bid of L. W. Metzger, who received the contract, was sufficiently low, that at the same rates the court can hard-surface 525 feet more than provided for in the original plans, and this extension has been ordered by the court. The contract now provides for the expenditure of \$11,479.58.

COEDS OF CALIF. CLAIM AN INSULT

SEATTLE, Wash., Apr. 3.—University of California women have been "insulted and do not desire further relations with University of Washington women," Miss Benary Wilkison, manager of the California debating team, has informed Miss Dorothy T. George manager of the Husky squad it was learned here today.

The dark clouds gathered last month when a triangular women's debate was proposed between the Universities of California, Oregon and Washington. California girls were reported against discussing child labor and kindred subjects. They submitted topics in a lighter vein, such as college life or the future of our grand children. An agreement failed, and Washington and Oregon held joint debates here and in Eugene, Oregon, last night, the Huskies winning 5 to 1.

Purple and gold coeds pointed out that the University of Washington Daily, a student publication, recently defended the California girls in an editorial on debate topics.

LACK OF FUNDS MAY CAUSE CATHEDRALE TO CLOSE ITS DOORS

LONDON, April 3.—The poorest cathedral in Christendom is Southwark cathedral, according to the Bishop of Woolwich.

There is practically no endowment, the bishop declared, and the dean, the sub-dean and canon were not paid a single penny. The cathedral is in a poor locality and for 12 years the windows have not been cleaned, because of lack of finances. The organization faces bankruptcy.

GREAT FUTURE FOR OREGON DAIRYMEN

The Dairy Industry of the Pacific Slope is undergoing a marked change. The ever-growing city population is reaching further into the country for milk and where once there was a decided surplus of butter shipped to eastern markets, now the tide is turned and large quantities of butter are shipped into California to make up a shortage created by the demand for market milk.

The last report of California Dairy Council gives some interesting figures. San Francisco and Los Angeles received during December 1924, 5,321,479 pounds of butter. Of this nearly one third or 1,734,067 pounds came from outside of the state. Idaho furnished 632,210 pounds, Washington 490,989 pounds, and other states shipping in carloads or more were: Oregon, Nevada, Utah, Montana, Colorado and Nebraska.

Butter manufacture in California increased, but very little during the year. The market milk industry increased tremendously. This is a normal development and will continue. The states west of the Rockies, north and east of California will find an ever-increasing market in San Francisco and Los Angeles for butter and cheese. These two great cities are noted for their demand for high standard of quality in butter and cheese.

Oregon, Washington and Idaho are so situated that they will be in position to supply the greater part of the butter and cheese required by California and will come to a position in relation to San Francisco and Los Angeles similar to that held by Wisconsin and Minnesota to Chicago and New York.

This is the Northwest's opportunity. Already these states are alive to the situation and are bringing to bear every force possible to put the standard of their products on a high quality basis in order that they may secure for themselves the full benefit of these great southern markets. Much needs to be done in standardization for quality, and in making uniform the factors of workmanship, color, salt and uniform packing. These qualities all have a marked effect on the ready marketing of the product.

The movement of butter, particularly from the Northwest, is only beginning. The future will show great developments and now, in the formative stage of this movement, steps should be taken to create in the minds and tastes of the California consumer, a demand based on the high quality of the northwestern products. It will mean many millions of profit to the dairymen of these states if it becomes the fixed idea amongst consumers in California that Northwest butter is the best butter they can get.

These conditions point to the necessity of a high appreciation on the part of producers and manufacturers for better cows, better equipment and the saving of unnecessary labor in order to make the most of their opportunity.
