W. C. T. U. DOLLAR DAY APPEAL TO BE MADE TUESDAY



Tomorrow the W. C. T. U. of Oregon is going to appeal to the people of this state for aid in extending the farm home which has been created at Corvallis for the care of orphan or dependent children. The appeal is in the form of a "Dollar Day" and every person is requested to give at least one dollar, and more if possible, to aid in this most important work. The money which the people of the state are to give for the home, is not to be used for maintenance, nor for the care of the children now in the home, but is to be devoted exclusively to increasing the facilities sufficiently to care for at least a few of the needy youngsters now being turned away from the institution. Pious appeals have been made to the W. C. T. U. to take orphan or dependent children into the home where they may be given a chance to become someone in life other than state wards and perhaps criminals. The juvenile courts all over the state have time and time again brought to the great organization cases of direct need, only to find that the home was full and that there was no room for the little youngster for whom help was so badly desired. The institution was started for the purpose of giving to dependent children a real home, and not care of an institutional nature. At present there are three cottages, each cottage being in charge of a "mother" and an "aunt", and the children are given home instruction and training as nearly as possible as a parent would give it to them. Although the home is strictly Protestant, it is conducted absolutely on a non-sectarian basis, and although bible reading and the prayer circle are a part of the daily routine of each home, no touch of church creed is allowed to enter in. The children are given practical training, are taught to work with their hands, and when they leave which will fit them to make their own way in the world. The appeal of the W. C. T. U. is for funds with which they may add more cottages and give help to more children. The need is great, but the funds are limited, and unless a hearty response is given this plea, many children which otherwise might become useful, worthy citizens are apt to become delinquents, and instead of filling places of usefulness in professional trade or business, may fill felon cells. The farm is supported by a steady income, part of which come from the state. Provisions are raised on the large farm, where the children learn scientific methods of farming and horticulture. The need now is not for maintenance, but for extension, and tomorrow it is expected that the people of Roseburg and Douglas County, will unite in doing their part to foster and aid this most important project.
