COUNTY PLANS TO TAKE GRAVEL FOR ROAD IMPROVEMENT

The Douglas County Court this morning started a tour of inspection of the gravel bars throughout the county, looking for sources of road surfacing material. During the spring and summer the county expects to spread gravel over many miles of county road, and is endeavoring to produce materials as near as possible to the various projects.

Bunkers are being maintained at Garden Valley to supply districts 11, 30, 37, 62, and 74, as well as the roads east of Roseburg, the county planning to spend about \$10,500 during the year in graveling roads in those districts.

Elton bunkers will supply districts 7, 9, 31, 52 and 53, there being about \$4,200 allotted to those districts.

Gravel is also to be procured at Glide at the E. A. Blakely place, to improve roads in that vicinity, while the Wilbur quarry will supply districts 28, 59 and 77. Other localities will be served as far as possible from gravel deposits in their own vicinity, when this gravel is found suitable for road surfacing.

JACKSON SPORTS-MEN ENDORSE BILL

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
MEDFORD, Ore., April 4.—At a meeting of the Jackson county game protective association here last night it was unanimously decided to endorse the proposed referendum of house bill 592, passed by the recent legislature, taking ten per cent of the game fund for general state expenditures.

A committee was also appointed to advise with the state game commission as to where and what kinds of fish to plant in Jackson county and it was decided to take immediate action to stop the illegal killing of China pheasants in Southern Oregon, it being maintained by several speakers that these birds will soon be wiped out unless the present unrestricted slaughter is stopped.

CRISIS NEARS IN FRANCE OVER PLAN TO PAY OFF DEBT

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PARIS, April 4.—Premier Herriot is still holding out for a straight capital levy as a solution of France's financial problems, while M. De Monzie, the new minister of finance, is insisting that there shall be a voluntary contribution of capital.

The cabinet met this morning to thresh out this new conflict inside the government.

Opening under such difficult circumstances, the week is regarded as supporting the premier, as likely to prove fatal to the cabinet.

Bills providing for an increase in the bank note circulation amounting to four billion francs and for a voluntary 10 per cent contribution by capital, were presented to the cabinet today by De Monzie.

The cabinet will meet again tonight to finish discussion of these measures which will be presented to the Chamber of Deputies tomorrow.

It is understood that M. De Monzie will stake confidence on their adoption.

The sort of capital levy provided for in the bills will be technically a loan to the state bearing four per cent interest. It will be payable in cash or French government securities at a slight above market quotations and will be devoted to amortization of the debt.

M. De Monzie is determined to resort to a straight capital levy plan only if the proposed measure prove unacceptable. These measures were debated by the cabinet for two hours and a half and it was decided to adjourn until tonight.

PRINCE OF WALES LANDS IN AFRICA

BATHURST GAMBIA, West Africa, April 4.—The Prince of Wales has completed the first leg of his tour to Africa and South America. He arrived here this morning on board the battle cruiser Repulse.

After a week's voyage through health giving sunshine, the Repulse anchored at six o'clock a few miles off the port, being unable to approach nearer because of the shallow water. Captain Cecil H. Armitage, governor of Gambia settlement put off in his own yacht to convey the prince and his party to Bathurst. The yacht left the cruiser at 3 o'clock landing here shortly afterwards.

The weather was extremely hot during the last two days of the voyage.

The Prince of Wales sailed from Portsmouth, England, on board H. M. S. Repulse on the afternoon of March 28 for his lengthy and protracted visit to Africa and South America. While in Africa the Prince will be taken among the Zulu chiefs and will see all the interesting places of the vast continent. His South American itinerary will include visits to Uruguay, various parts of Argentina and a portable crossing of the Andes to Santiago, Chile.

During a greater part of the journey the Repulse will be the Prince's home.

VENUE CHANGE SOUGHT

BOMBAY, India, April 6.—All nine of the men charged with attempting last January to abduct the Nautch girl Mumtaz Begum, former favorite of the Maharaja of Indore, were committed by the magistrate today after a preliminary hearing for trial in the Bombay high court.

It is understood the defense is circulating a petition to be submitted to the viceroy asking that the case be transferred to another jurisdiction on the ground that it would be impossible to obtain a fair trial before a Bombay jury.

WEEKS IMPROVING

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Secretary Weeks continued to gain rapidly today in his recovery from the slight stroke of cerebral thrombosis which has confined him to his home since last Wednesday. His condition was regarded as so favorable that his son, Sinclair, returned last night to Houston. Mr. Weeks is not expected to be permitted to leave his room for several days.

WITHOLD TAX RECORDS

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Internal revenue collectors have been ordered by Commissioner Blair to withhold the new income tax records from public inspection until given further authority from the internal revenue bureau.

The tax returns will not be available to the public until after July 1 at the earliest and treasury officials predict that the constitutionality of newspaper publication of the tax limits will have been determined by the supreme court by that time.

QUESTION CONVICTS.

SALEM, Ore., April 4.—John Shipley, deputy sheriff from Chehalis, Wash., will be here today according to a letter written to Warden A. M. Lagrange, to interview A. C. Dorner and J. W. Mack, two convicts at the state penitentiary, who claim to be the slayers of a man whose skeleton was found near Chehalis recently on Tillamook river. Shipley expects to interview the convicts this afternoon.

SURPRISE IS SPRUNG.

LONDON, April 4.—A surprise was sprung in the Bloomsbury mystery house inquest today, when the coroner after hearing the testimony regarding finding of the bodies of Granville Cooke and Selwyn Foster adjourned the inquiry until April 25. It was announced that a complete analysis of the bodies in an attempt to explain the mysterious deaths would require three weeks longer. Before the coroner jury adjourned, the coroner, Dr. William Fairlie testified that Cook's death was clearly due to gas poisoning.

TO RACE IN FRISCO.

SEATTLE, April 4.—A race in San Francisco April 30th will be the last in America, a telegram received here today indicated, for Paavo Nurmi of Finland, world's premier distance runner.

The telegram was sent by Fredrick Rubieck, secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union and said that Nurmi had planned to sail for England early next month, and was anxious to return east immediately after his California appearance. Washington had invited the Finn to race here May 2 or 9.

COURSE COMPLETED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 6. (Special)—Dr. Lucetta Smith of Roseburg is one of the group of students which has completed courses offered by the University of Oregon Extension Division. Dr. Smith completed a course in Early American Literature.

In the period from January 1 to March 15, sixty-six students enrolled in the University correspondence courses from the state of Oregon attained completion in these courses. Out-of-town students number nine.

BULL TREES TWO HUNTERS; COWBOY TO THE RESCUE

SACRAMENTO, April 6.—"Bud" and "I" Tarns, Sacramento hunters, sealed an oak tree yesterday afternoon when a angry bull chased them. Their wives, who witnessed their frenzied dash for the tree, summoned a cowboy after an hour's search.

The cowboy's first attempt at rescue proved a failure as the horse balked at carrying three passengers and threw the riders to the ground. The hunters rode back to the tree. The cowboy examined his seat and induced the infuriated bull to chase him while the hunters descended from the tree and raced to their automobile.

BUILD BIG MILLS.

SALEM, Ore., April 4.—At a conference today by the promoters of the proposed flax weaving and spinning mills in Salem and the local committee working on the project the committee members will make known the amount they will subscribe and a date will be set for a mass meeting when other subscriptions will be taken.

The plan calls for a \$200,000 establishment of which it is estimated that \$700,000 will be raised in Salem. Silverton and Albany men have indicated that \$50,000 can be expected from each of those cities and D. M. Sanson, the promoter will put up a minimum of \$50,000.

AMERICAN RIFLES SOUGHT FOR GOOD MARKSMANSHIP.

STOCKHOLM, March 18.—Swedish marksmen, meeting by their observation of American methods in the 1924 Olympic Games and by their knowledge of American rifles, which they tried out on several occasions, have decided to import a number of American sporting weapons and a quantity of American powder. While a high standard of excellence has been obtained in Sweden through the use of the Swedish army rifle, a .43 Mannus, they are convinced that the weapons used by the United States entree in the Olympic Games gave better results.

GEN. VON HINDENBURG REFUSES THE PRESIDENCY

BERLIN, April 6.—General von Hindenburg has declined to be a candidate for the presidency of the German republic. This decision having been made known it is reported that Dr. Karl Jarroz, who was temporarily put aside in favor of the general, will be nominated shortly as a candidate of the nationalist combination in the April 26 elections.

MISSIONARIES IN DANGER IN CHINESE HOSTILITIES

PEKING, April 6.—Headquarters of the China Inland Mission at Shanghai has telegraphed today stating that Hunan government troops are attacking Szechuan, where the China Inland Mission, Tussockman, and his wife, are stationed. A later message states that Assistant Secretary-in-Chief, Charles Ross, has been notified that the danger there has become intensified.

The British legation has notified the Chinese government that the foreign office has wired to the military governor of Hunan ordering him to take immediate steps for the protection of the missionaries and other foreign lives in a property in the district.
