FLOOD DOES DAMAGE

PASADENA, CAL., Apr. 4.—Sweeping down Sawpit Canyon, recently devastated by forest fires, a five foot wall of water carrying huge trunks of trees, boulders and debris, lurked the Pacific Electric tracks east of Monrovia early today under ten feet of mud and rock. Hundreds of chickens were drowned in lower Duarte and the streams in the mountains are reported to be rising.

Reports from North Primrose, back of Monrovia, were that 1.70 inches of rain had fallen during the storm.

PERUVIAN CONSUL TO BE DIVORCED

CHICAGO, Apr. 4.—Diplomatic immunity, which previously has saved Dr. Mitridates De Plata, Peruvian consul in Chicago from facing a divorce suit was overruled today by Judge Joseph Sabath, who indicated he would grant a divorce to Mrs. Edna De Plata, teacher of languages. Her attorneys presented affidavits to support his contention that a state court had jurisdiction.

Mrs. De Plata alleged that the consul while enroute to Peru, met a Seattle dancer, at Colocna, Panama, and became so enamored that he returned with her to New York and was about to announce their engagement to marry at a dinner party in New York, when the wife says she broke up the affair.

Mrs. De Plata testified her husband had numerous affairs and presented several letters and telegrams. The chief witness was Louise De Plata, seven years old, who told of going to New York with her mother.

"We say Daddy," said the child. "He was with a lady and had a flower in his coat. Mamma went up to him and he tried to choke her. Six men came in and I cried." Upon another occasion, the child said, her father attacked her mother with a butcher knife.

Miss Adela Haler of Seattle, who is the dancer named by Mrs. De Plata, Dr. De Plata has contended his wife's evidence could not be used in court against a foreign consul against whom a divorce action could not be brought within the jurisdiction of the courts.

SAWMILL IS BURNED.

EUGENE, Ore., April 4.—Total destruction of the buildings and equipment of the Dutton Lumber company sawmill at West Lake on the west side of Siletco Lake, resulted from a blaze of unknown origin that broke out shortly before midnight last night and swept the plant. The mill had been closed for the past several months.

The plant had a capacity of 40,000 feet when in operation, and preparations had been made for a re-opening of the mill early next week. The mill was owned by the Dutton Lumber company of Portland.

Sheriff Frank E. Taylor left for the scene to investigate the origin of the blaze.

Mitchell died four hours later at an Everett hospital.

QUARANTINE STILL ON.

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 4.—No change in the quarantine of importation of California, cattle, sheep and swine into Oregon will be made at present, the state livestock sanitary board decided at a special meeting yesterday. Any action exposing Oregon livestock to the hoof and mouth disease will be opposed, Governor Pierce indicated. He intimated that in addition to protecting Oregon livestock the quarantine might have the effect of improving the cattle market in Portland.

OPPOSE MINE RIGHTS.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Apr. 4.—Knights of the Ku Klux Klan at a meeting here last night passed a resolution of protest against the proposed contract between the state internal improvement board and L. M. Hirschfeld of California, giving the latter the right to mine Jacksonville beaches.

An account of the meeting, together with copies of the resolution were given newspapers today by a Klan committee. The resolution, copies of which are to be sent to Governor Martin and to the secretary of the internal improvement board, opposes in full force the leasing of Jacksonville's greatest natural asset, the beaches, for private gain.

PROSECUTION RESTS.

BOMBAY, India, Apr. 4.—The prosecution conceded its case today in the preliminary hearing of the nine men charged with attempting last January to abduct Mumtaz Begum the Nautch girl and erstwhile favorite of the Maharaja of Indore. It is expected the accused will be committed Monday for trial in the higher court at Madras, the change of venue being on the plea of the defense that a Bombay jury would be biased in favor of the prosecution.
