WADDELL NAMED ON BATTLESHIP BOARD

SALEM, Ore., April 7.—Governor Pierce today appointed the battleship Oregon commission under an act of the 1925 legislature, which will have charge of the old man o' war when it is brought to Portland, including the administration of the \$15,000 annual appropriation for its maintenance. The members of the commission are: Cora A. Thompson, Portland, past president of the General National Auxiliary of the Spanish War Veterans; Lafe Manning, Portland, who served on the Oregon during the Spanish war; Colonel Carlie Abrams, Salem, past state commander of the Spanish War Veterans; Howard C. Waddell, Roseburg, past state commander of the Spanish War Veterans; and U. G. Warrilow, Portland, commander of Scout Young Camp, Spanish War Veterans.

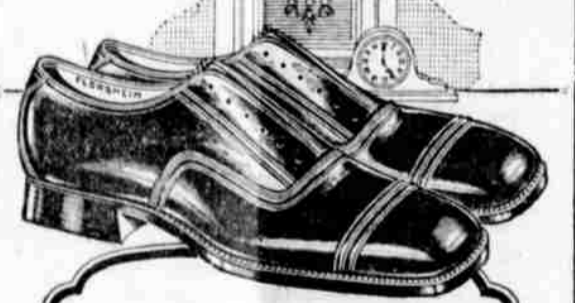
