MURDERED GIRL HAD JILTED HER SOLDIER SLAYER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
MANILA, April 9.—Friends of Miss Audrey Burlleigh, former Memphis, Tenn., girl who was shot to death early last Sunday morning by Lieutenant J. S. Thompson, a young army officer, in an automobile near Manila, said today that Miss Burlleigh had promised to marry Lieutenant Thompson if he would resign from the army. Thompson wrote out his resignation, then, according to friends, she had a change of heart and changed her mind.
 Just before the shooting Miss Burlleigh participated in a theatrical sponsored by the army and navy club. Thompson objected to her participation in the performance, but she disregarded his protest. When Miss Burlleigh made known her intention not to marry Lieutenant Thompson, has not been revealed.
 A letter of resignation from the army written by Thompson, now held for court martial on a charge of first degree murder, was found in his effects today under date of April 3. The lieutenant said he was resigning on account of insufficient pay. Brigadier General Charles J. Symonds will preside at the court martial. If the proceedings result in a conviction it must be reviewed by President Coolidge.

ANTI-SOVIETS GAIN HEAVILY IN MOSCOW

MOSCOW, April 9.—The results in the election for the Moscow Soviet which closed on Tuesday show that 2,553 communists and 1,208 members of other parties were elected, among them more than 800 women. The non-communist party will have 334 percent of the total membership of the new Moscow city council compared with 123 in the last one.

 Wheeler—Contract let for 24 miles grading to the North Fork bridge.
 Klamath Falls—Chiloquin Lumber Co. has 60 men at work logging; new box plant being built.
 La Grande—Grande Ronde Lumber Co. mill at Perry opens with one shift of 160 men. Second shift to be added soon. Cut will be 25,000,000 feet a year.
 Salem—Marion county has 1,243 miles of road, 1122 paved, 614 graded, 135 graded, besides city and village pavements. About 16 miles to be paved this year.
 Marshfield—Piles driven for new Oesau dock, and building begins at once.
 Marshfield—Construction of a new concrete office building starts.
 State highway construction projects for 1925 call for about \$6,000,000. John Day highway, Dallas-California route, and Home-vet coast highway are the major items.

FOR BAIL UP TO SUPREME COURT

CHICAGO, April 9.—William D. Shepherd's last chance for release from jail pending his trial on charges of killing with typhoid germ his foster-son, William Nelson McClintock, orphan millionaire, lies with the Illinois Supreme Court in Springfield.
 Decision by the court on a motion for a writ of habeas corpus, filed by his counsel yesterday for presentation to the court today, is expected within a few days.
 William Scott Stewart, Shepherd's counsel, said he expected the writ would be made returnable as soon as possible.
 Chicago authorities meanwhile awaited a report tonight or tomorrow from the coroner's chemist who has been making poison tests on the body of Dr. Oscar Olson, formerly McClintock's physician, who died two years ago, shortly after he received a visit from Shepherd.
