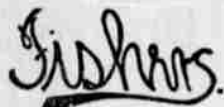

STAGES ARE PUT ON NEW SCHEDULE

A change has been made in the schedule of the stage lines operating out of the city, the changes becoming effective on Wednesday, April 15. Stages, under the new time table, will arrive from the north at 11 a. m.; 4:10 p. m.; 7:10 p. m.; and 10:10 p. m. They will arrive from the south at 12:45 a. m.; 4:30 p. m.; and 10:30 p. m. They will reach the city from Coos Bay at 11 a. m.; 4 p. m.; and 9 p. m.

The departure time for the north will be 7:20 a. m.; 11:20 a. m.; 1:20 p. m.; and 4:50 p. m. Stages will leave for the south at 8 a. m.; 11:30 a. m.; and 4:20 p. m. The Coos Bay stages will depart at 8 a. m.; 1:20 p. m.; and 4:20 p. m.

With the exception of the 4:50 p. m. stage, leaving here in that direction will go through to Portland the same day. The last stage, however, operating as a local to Eugene, connecting there with the northbound local stage for Portland.

The stages going south at 8 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. connect with the buses operating into Klamath Falls.

The new schedule has been adopted, according to W. A. Cummings, the local agent, in order to give better service to the patrons of the stage line. The stages operate on a schedule which connects them with branch lines running out from the highway.

OPPONENTS OF HERRIOT REPLY TO HIS CHARGES
(Continued from page 1.)

from Governor Robinson of the Bank of France, to Finance Minister Clementel on December 29, 1924, warning the latter that the local limit of circulation was being reached and entreating him to take measures to prevent inflation which would be ruinous to the country's credit. This warning, he said, was repeated in letters of February 5 and 28.

Francis Marsal forcibly called attention to the fact that on April 2, when the circulation already had exceeded the legal limit by two billion francs, Premier Herriot in the senate solemnly declared his government opposed all inflation.

The former minister concluded by quoting "M. Clementel's inventory" of a few months, in which in the name of the government it was said that inflation would be considered a crime against the nation.

"Neither inflation, a forced loan, nor any other fiscal measure the present measure may put through can restore the lost confidence of the country in the men now governing France," Francis Marsal declared.

"The senate will judge."

PARIS, April 19.—Charles De La Syster, finance minister in the first Poincare cabinet, issued a note today denying that the legal limit of note circulation had ever been exceeded during his ministry. He stated that the treasury was so embarrassed at four times during his two years of service that he was obliged to ask the banks to subscribe to a supplementary issue of national defense bonds, but such operations were quickly terminated by repayment as the bonds fell due.

"It is unquestionable," he said, "that the first time this limit was exceeded was under Premier Herriot last October."
