NEVER BETTER IS REPORT MADE ON STOCK IN OREGON

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., April 11.—A summary of the livestock condition after the close of the winter months reveals the fact that Oregon livestock in the main wintered exceptionally well, according to Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, notwithstanding the fact that many herds went into winter quarters with less tallow on their ribs than for many years.

"During the winter months," says Lytle, "quite rigorous weather was encountered, but the cold spell lasted only for a brief period during which time there was some loss of thin animals. The losses were confined chiefly to horses on the public domain and to thin cattle."

"There was some loss experienced in ewe bands, particularly among the old ewe members of the flocks. This was in part due to the fact that some of the Oregon flocks have not been sold down to the young breeding animals as closely as in former years."

"During the liquidation period a considerable percentage of the strictly range district flock masters were forced to sell their younger animals and in these districts there was perhaps a seven per cent ewe loss. The animals were not valuable excepting for their ability to raise a lamb."

"The health of the Oregon livestock was never better, outside of some losses in horses, which have been due to botulism caused by the eating of mouldy or botulinus infected food. This infection is the same that caused the California olive poisoning."

"The cattle herds of the state have been relatively free from disease. The sheep herds are free from sheep scabies for the first time in a number of years. A light lamb loss has been experienced by a few breeders engaged in winter lambing."

"Diseases in hogs have been confined chiefly to pneumonia in young pigs and young stock animals. As far as we know there has been no home cholera reported in Oregon since the first of the year. The tuberculosis eradication program is being vigorously carried on in Oregon. There was passed at the last session of the legislature, a compulsory tuberculin test law for all that territory in Oregon lying west of the Cascade range. This will insure the compulsory tuberculin testing of 99 per cent of the dairy animals of the state. A survey recently completed by the United States Department of Agriculture shows that in all excepting six counties of Oregon there is less than 1 per cent of tuberculosis, which is a record equalled by but few states in the Union."

TELEGRAPH SCHOOL GETS RECOGNITION

Recently the Roseburg Telegraph Institute, a school teaching telegraphy conducted by E. K. McLendon, Associated Press operator for the Roseburg News-Review, gained recognition from one of the large commercial telegraph companies, which offered positions to operators graduating from the school. Since that time other letters have been received by Mr. McLendon from practically all of the leading railroad and commercial companies in the Pacific Northwest, prouiding to give consideration to all applicants for positions who graduate from this school with his recommendations. Some stated that they were pleased to note that such a school had been formed in this territory, particularly since instruction is given in all forms of telegraph work which is a departure from the usual school of this kind, which endeavors only to teach the Morse code, giving no attention to forms and office routine, which in the local school is considered one of the essentials and taught the student-operator.

The field from which positions are offered, Mr. McLendon says, includes practically all of the Pacific Coast states, extending from Texas on the south to Montana on the north.

The result of this recognition Mr. McLendon announced today, is to assure the permanency of this enterprise, which was started in Roseburg last October. He is now looking forward to an extension of the present facilities to meet the urgent need for a school of this character in Roseburg.

The class which started last October will graduate within a few weeks. A new class was recently organized and students are now enrolled for graduation in the fall.

FORMER ELKTON MAN KILLS SELF

William B. McClay, for 37 years a resident of Elkton, killed himself yesterday at his residence near Talent, according to word received this morning. Mr. McClay, who was 65 years of age, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head with a .22 calibre rifle about 10 o'clock yesterday morning according to word received. He lived until about 8 p. m. when death occurred. The body is to be taken to Elkton, where Mr. McClay spent many years of his life, and where relatives now reside, and the funeral services were held today.

Mr. McClay had been in poor health for several years. It was stated, and depression over his condition is believed to have been the cause for his act. He moved to Talent about 18 months ago in the hope of improving his health. 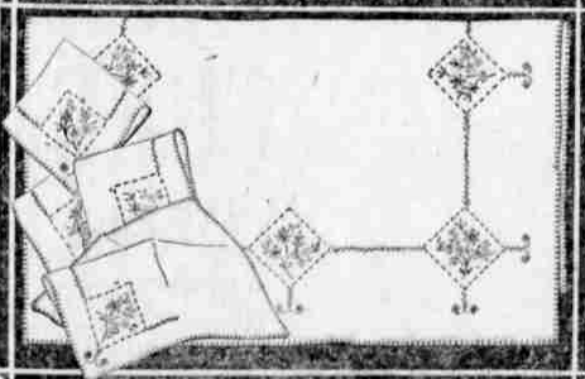
