SUTHERLIN WILL HAVE NEW AUTO TOURIST CAMP

Arrangements have been completed whereby Sutherland is assured one of the largest and most attractive auto camp grounds along the Pacific Highway.

The camp ground became assured last Saturday when Balfour, Guthrie & Co., through its local representative, F. M. Compton, sold to O. Sigmund, of Everett, Wash., lots 16, 17, 21, 22 and 23, and lots 5 to 12 inclusive, in block 19, all located on the west side of State street between First and Second avenues, and comprising a total of 13 lots.

Mr. Sigmund was right on the job Monday with surveyors setting stakes for the twenty-four cabins and main building to be erected and the alleys and streets which are to cross the property.

SUTHERLIN BOYS INJURED IN MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT

Claud Selbeck and Jerry DeMuth, two local boys are confined to their homes here with broken legs and serious cuts and bruises about their bodies as the result of a motorcycle accident which occurred two miles north of town Tuesday evening, says the Sutherland Sun.

The two boys were riding on a motorcycle owned by Claud Selbeck, who it is understood, was giving Jerry instructions in regard to operating the machine.

Both boys were unconscious when a passing tourist, who chanced to witness the accident, went to their assistance. They were placed in the car of the tourist and brought to Sutherland where Drs. DeVore and Dunlap were summoned to attend them.

An examination revealed that Selbeck had sustained a bad fracture of the right leg in two places, besides several severe cuts and bruises. DeMuth sustained a fracture and laceration of his left ankle, while both legs and his left arm were badly cut and bruised.
