**Want War Trophies—**

Governor Pierce will be asked to allot several pieces of the captured German cannons to Roseburg in the event Oregon is successful in securing their share of the trophies. Approximately 40 tons of captured material will be allotted to Oregon, Governor Pierce was advised by the chief of ordnance at Washington. 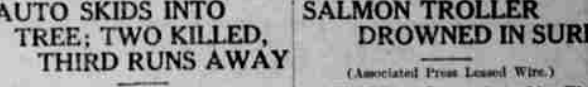

**AUTO SKIDS INTO TREE; TWO KILLED, THIRD RUNS AWAY**

ABERDEEN, Wash., Apr. 14.—H. E. Wallace of Seattle and an unknown woman were instantly killed about 11:30 o'clock last night when a big touring car in which they and a second man were riding towards Aberdeen skidded at a sharp turn ten miles east of here and crashed into a tree. The second man, believed to have suffered no injury, fled from the scene of the wreck immediately. Efforts are now under way to identify the woman.

**SALMON TROLLER DROWNED IN SURF**

ASTORIA, Ore., Apr. 14.—The first fatality of the year in the fishing industry occurred last Saturday night when Roy Hammas, was drowned at the entrance to the Columbia river. Hammas and Stanford Hanaker were crossing into the river in the trolling boat Wild West when they were caught in heavy breakers on Peacock spit. The boat capsized and Hanaker kept afloat by swimming until another boat picked him up. Hammas had disappeared and the boat was lost in the surf.
