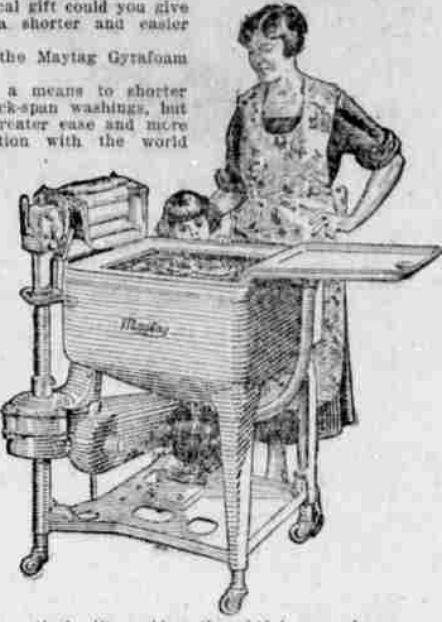

TWELVE MILLION DOLLAR CONCERN FOR IDAHO TOWN

(Associated Press Local Wire.) LEWISTON, Ida., April 14.—The Lewiston city council last night accepted the proposals of the Clearwater Timber Company and the Inland Power and Light Company in the matter of establishing mills, power plant and log storage in the Clearwater river at Lewiston. The city is bound to give assistance in the matter of securing sites at reasonable prices and the companies agree to begin operations at once and to have the plants in operation by the spring or early summer of 1927. The investments of the two companies at Lewiston will be more than five million dollars.

The action of the council secures to the Clearwater Valley an extension of the railroad into the Clearwater timber belt by the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific Railroads. The two companies will join in this development and are a part of the agreement of the Clearwater Timber Company and the Inland Power and Light Company.
