Socialist organ BEGINS WAR ON VON HINDENBURG

BERLIN, April 15.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is now fair game for his political opponents, says Vorwaerts, the socialist organ, which declares the republican parties in Germany for the past five years had scrupulously lived up to a gentleman's agreement which prescribed a "closed season" for the venerable field marshal.

It was understood, said Vorwaerts, that Von Hindenburg was not to be dragged into controversies over the loss of the war or conduct of the war and the halo which popular acclaim placed over the head of the hero of Tannenberg was to remain sacred.

"REVELATION" OF MORMON LEADER TO UNITE CHURCH

INDEPENDENT, Mo., April 15.—Announcement that a revelation had been received by Albert M. Smith, associate of President Frederick M. Smith, of the reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, urging peace upon the general conference of the members of the church, is the voice of God through the presidency to the congregation on a matter of great importance.

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After delivering a word of consolation to the people of the church, the revelation, as reported by Smith, asked:

"And was it not God rather than man who set Frederick M. Smith in the presidency?"

Continuing the appeal for peace, the revelation said:

"Verily, verily, verily, let nothing separate you from each other and from the work and from the church wherunto I have called you. And thus shall peace and glory and blessing be with you."

WOODBURN RAID

HEAVY BLOW TO BOOTLEG TRADE

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 15.—One line of the moonshine traffic extending from Woodburn, Marion county, to as far south as Roseburg, Douglas county, was cut off today when Justice of the Peace Small sentenced R. L. Wells to six months in the county jail and fined him \$500 in addition, while James Williams and Lawrence Montgomery, said to be co-partners of Wells, both pleaded not guilty and their bail was fixed at \$1,000 each.

The three men were arrested yesterday by William H. Lovens, state prohibition commissioner; George Hurlbut, a federal agent, and Roy Bremner, a Marion county deputy sheriff. Lovens filed the complaint.

Following the arrest of the three, confiscation of their 100-gallon still and their imprisonment in the county jail, the vicinity of the still was searched and 50 gallons of moonshine was found in the brush.

Williams and Montgomery asked for a jury trial in justice court and this will be held next Wednesday.

MOTHER OF TWO POISONED BOYS TO GO ON TRIAL

CROWN POINT, Ind., Apr. 15.—A charge of murder was preferred today against Mrs. Anna Cunningham of Gary, Ind., in an affidavit alleging that she killed by poison her own son, Walter Cunningham, 13, who died September 29, 1923.

When served with the warrant charging her with murder, Mrs. Cunningham fainting in her cell. It was her second collapse since her imprisonment in jail.

Although Mrs. Cunningham had recovered somewhat today from the collapse she suffered in jail here yesterday, Prosecutor Bremner said that he had decided to dispense with the sanity hearing and to issue affidavits charging two instances of murder by arsenical poisoning in connection with the deaths of two of her children, Mrs. Anna Cunningham of Gary, Ind., would be charged formally with murder before tonight.
