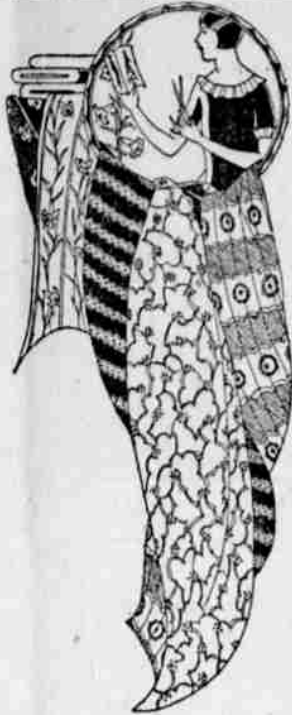

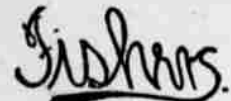

NEW POSTAL RATES ARE NOW IN EFFECT

The new postal rates, recently adopted, became effective today, and the new schedule of charges is now in operation. The most radical change is on private mailing cards, which formerly required only one cent postage, but now take two cents. This applies to all post cards except the regulation government card which still goes for one cent. There is no change in the first class letter mail, but there is an increase of two cents on all parcel post packages. The post office department has introduced several new features, one being a handling charge of 25 cents for parcel post packages. This expedites the package in transit as it is handled with first class mail and is not held up at terminals, as is the case with fourth class mail. Special delivery stamps can also be secured for parcel post packages.

Advertising mail going out under permit, is increased from 1 cent to 1 1/2 cents, and stamps of that denomination are obtainable, as well as wrappers. There are also changes in the money order charges and in the registry department. All clerks and carriers are fully informed on the new rules and can give detailed information to those desiring it.

M'NARY ADVISES STEAMSHIP SALE TO DOLLAR FIRM

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, April 15.—A suggestion that the Dollar interests be required to purchase the vessels they now are operating for the shipping board was made to President Coolidge today by Senator McNary, republican, Oregon.
If this should be done, Senator McNary is of the opinion that there would be removed much of the basis for criticism of the action of the board in selling to the Dollar interests the five president-type ships now operated by a competitor, the Pacific Mail Steamship Company.
The three commissioners who dissented to the sale of five ships to the Dollar interests—Captain Plummer, Thompson, and Benson—will file separate answers in the district of Columbia supreme court in the injunction proceedings brought by the Pacific Mail to prevent consummation of the sale.
They began preparations of their answers today after the board, by a vote of 4 to 3, had refused to permit them use of lawyers in the legal department of the board to act for them in making appearance and filing affidavits with the court.
The vote was on the same lines as that by which the sale was originally authorized.

DELECTABLE DISHES
DELICIOUS dishes of all kinds may be prepared in the winter, even when the fresh things are not in market. A delightful salad is the following, which can be served at any season:
Fig and Cheese Salad.—Mix to a paste any cream cheese, or cottage cheese, using one cupful; one cupful of dried figs, one-half cupful of roasted almonds, chopped, and two tablespoonfuls of orange juice. Mix and mold into balls and roll the balls in the chopped almonds. Place four or five of the balls on a bed of lettuce, garnish with sections of lemon and serve with:
Honey Dressing.—Take one half-cupful of strained honey; beat slowly into three well-beaten egg yolks. Place in a double boiler and stir over the heat until the mixture begins to thicken. Remove from the heat and beat until cool. Add salt and cayenne, a tablespoonful of lemon juice, and just before serving fold in a cupful of whipped cream.
Orange Shortcake.—For dessert, when it is hard to find something appetizing, prepare a rich biscuit dough and bake it in large-sized biscuits. Split them and butter well, making a small shortcake, using oranges that have been peeled, cut into small pieces, sprinkled with sugar and allowed to stand to season for an hour or two. Heat the fruit with plenty of juice on each layer and serve it hot.
Graham Pudding.—Take one-fourth of a cupful of butter, add one-half cupful of molasses, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one egg, one-half cupful of sour milk, one cupful of graham flour, one cupful of raisins, and spices to taste. Mix well and steam four hours. Serve with an
Egg Sauce.—Beat the whites of an egg until stiff; add one cupful of sugar to the beaten yolk, a pinch of salt, vanilla and one-half cupful of boiling milk, then stir in the egg white and serve at once.
Prunes, figs, as well as dates, may be stuffed with nuts, fondant or a cream cheese. Served as dessert they are wholesome, easy to prepare and especially good for children.

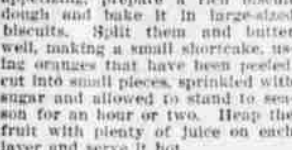
