\$100,000 FIRE IN CADIZ.

MANILA, April 16.—Two thousand natives were rendered homeless by a fire in Cadiz, Occidental Negros, province, which destroyed several hundred small homes there today. The fire started in a theatre and a number of persons were injured while leaving the burning building. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

ONLY ONE CASE OF CONTAGION IN CITY THIS WEEK

Only one case of contagious disease has been reported in the city during the past week, according to Dr. W. C. Belt, county physician. Last week there were six cases of mumps reported, but so far this week there has been only one new case, indicating that the danger of an epidemic has passed. There are eight cases of contagion under quarantine in the city, seven of mumps and one of scarlet fever.

OREGON POTATOES UNDER CALIFORNIA EMBARGO.

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 16.—To prevent the possibility of the importation of the Colorado potato beetle pest in shipments of potato tubers to the state of California, the state of California has put into effect a virtual quarantine, Charles L. Robinson, state supervisor of horticulture, has been advised.

During the active period of the pest from April 1 to September 30, all potatoes from the Pacific Northwest states must bear certification of inspection by the state departments of agriculture in order to be shipped into California.

The Colorado potato beetle is not found in districts of this state, where potatoes are grown in commercial quantities, Mr. Robinson said. "The threatened quarantine has all the earmarks of an embargo for commercial relations," Mr. Robinson declared.

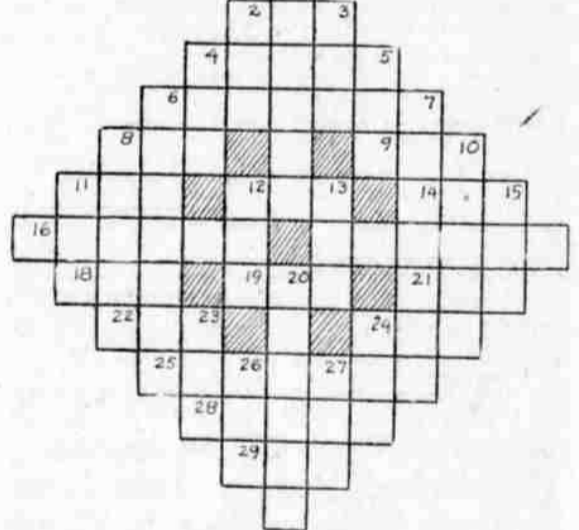
