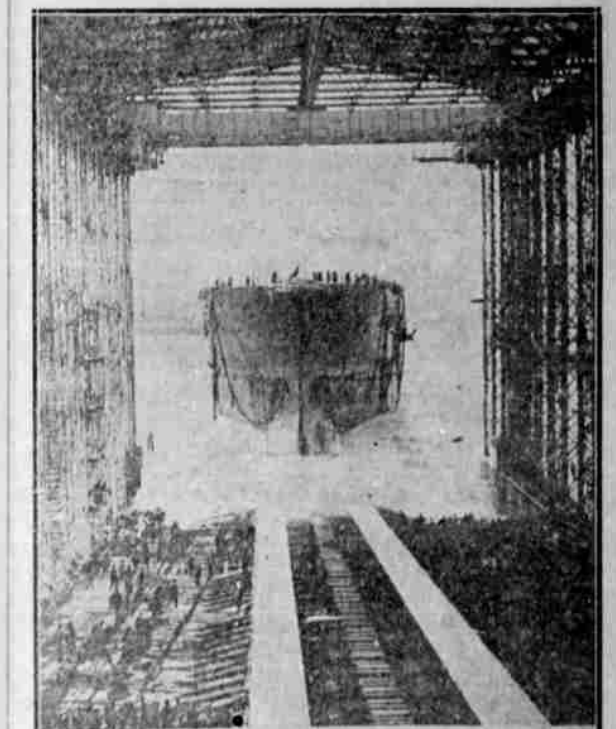

Wilbur, wife of the Secretary of the Navy. The 23,000-ton ship, with a speed of thirty-nine land miles an hour, will cost \$45,000,000 when completed. She will carry seventy-two airplanes, which she launches from her flat decks.
