NUTRITION WORKER COMING FROM O.A.C.

Miss Lucy A. Case, Assistant in Nutrition from the Oregon Agricultural College, is to be in the county for a stay of four days beginning Tuesday, April 21st. During this time she will put on the third of a series of nutrition schools in the Glendale, Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin and Yoncalla communities. Interest in this work has been growing rapidly in all sections in which Miss Case has been holding the schools.

At each meeting to be held in this series the morning session will be given over to demonstration of school lunches. The making of twelve kinds of sandwiches without the use of meat will be demonstrated, and many valuable hints on sandwich making will be available to the women who attend. Sandwiches are the acknowledged basis of all school, picnic or other quick lunch to be served or carried and partaken of where a hot meal is impossible and too elaborate, and the many things which will take the place of the cold meat sandwich will appeal to women who are called upon to prepare quick meals.

The afternoon sessions will consist of a talk by Miss Case on the subject of feeding of mothers and children and will undoubtedly prove of interest to a large number. These schools have been arranged through the office of B. W. Cooney, the County Agent, and all the women in the communities where the meetings are to be held are invited to be present and take part in one or both sessions of same.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

GROWERS SHOULD ASK FOR BETTER PRICES.

Sutherlin, Oregon, April 13.—To the Editor: As a person travels through the orchard districts of Sutherlin and Garden Valley, he is impressed with the general appearance of neglect. The orchards with a few rare exceptions, have not been pruned, sprayed or cultivated. A stranger or prospective purchaser can not understand this condition and wonders why these orchards, under proper care, can not be made to pay.

Orchard experts from the Hood River and Yakima country say that we produce apples and pears here superior to theirs in color and flavor. They admit that our climate and soil conditions here are ideal for producing fruit of superior quality. But for some reason or another, the industry here is in a deplorable condition. Independent buyers come into Douglas County last fall and bought the highest grade of Bartlett pears for \$50 per ton, while Yakima growers were getting from \$20 to \$40 for theirs. Last fall some price growers of Douglas County sold their pears for \$25 per ton, while the growers in the Yakima and Walla Walla districts were getting \$75 and \$85 for theirs.

We high school students are constantly being reminded that if we are to make a success in life we must practice careful business methods. We believe that "careful business methods" have been practiced by these buyers; but we wonder if the same methods have been practiced by the growers.

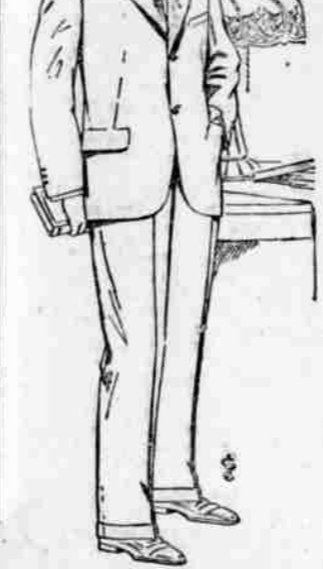
