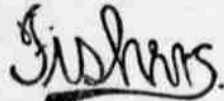

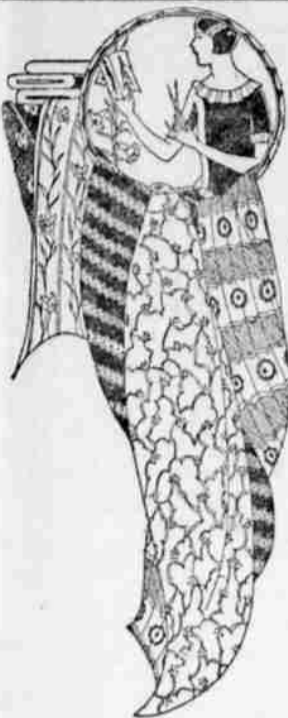

FOURTH SAFE AT KLAMATH FALLS IS BLOWN BY YEGGS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 16.—Expert safe-blowers last night blew open the safe in the office of the Big Basin Lumber Company and looted the strong box of its money contents. Officials of the company declined to make public the loss, although they said it was a small amount.

The yeggs are believed to be the same who have blown open three other safes here during the past two weeks. Police and Sheriff's deputies have been unable to obtain any clues.

OIL WELL WORK IS BEING HASTENED

With the work of reaming out the 14-inch hole at the Leeper Dome oil well to 16 inches in diameter completed, drillers are again busy sinking the shaft in the quest for the product that is believed to be underneath the rock-ribbed hill on the divide between the Calapooia creek and Sutherlin Valley. With resumption of drilling a new 2500 foot cable was installed Tuesday, and 1000 feet of 12 1/2-inch casing for the well will arrive at the Sutherlin station within a few days.

Those in touch with the work estimate the prospect for ultimate success of the enterprise very flattering, and express great optimism. Gas continues to flow from the well, and there is no lessening of the quantity or of the showing of oil that was struck some weeks ago. Superintendent J. J. Woodruff is considered by the management to be one of the most capable oil well drillers on the coast, being entirely familiar with the geological formation of the district, and expresses confidence in the final triumph of the work at Leeper Dome.

Predictions have been made by some of the men familiar with geological conditions here and the indications apparent in the well, that oil will be struck within 150 feet of the present depth. General Manager W. L. Cobb, however, is banking on going deeper than that, and is having all work done with the idea of continuing operations of sinking the well

KLANSMAN SAYS NOT GUILTY TO 5 INDICTMENTS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 16.—Motions to quash five indictments returned against D. C. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, charging him with an attack on Miss Madge Oberholzer, were overruled today by Judge James A. Collins in criminal court. Stephenson, through his attorney, Eph Imman, then entered a plea of not guilty.

Miss Oberholzer died Tuesday after an illness of four weeks attributed by her parents and her physicians to poison taken following the alleged attack by Stephenson. An inquest into her death was continued today by County Coroner Dr. Paul F. Robertson, and funeral services were planned for this afternoon.

Because of a crowded calendar, Judge Collins indicated it would be impossible to try the case before May 25. No definite date was fixed.

NORTHWEST WOOL BUYING OPENS AT FORTY-ONE CENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16.—The wool season has opened up in the Pacific Northwest. Shearings in full swing in Eastern Oregon and Idaho with several carloads of the Idaho clips already reported sold.

Eastern buyers have invaded the Caldwell section and are reported to be taking on supplies. It is understood that new clips have been taken account of and 41 cents.

The first big wool bid sale is scheduled at Mountain Home next Wednesday, April 22. It will be followed by two more sales in the same section, one on April 29 and one May 6.

Little buying has been done in Eastern Oregon and local dealers do not look for much activity in this state before summer two weeks. Buying is also quiet in Washington after the recent flurry around Yakima and Connell.

A considerable quantity of Washington and Idaho wool is expected to come to Portland this season both for sale and for storage and shipment.
