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REJECT PROPOSAL OF SHOEMAKER IS RECOMMENDATION

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17.—A proposal by Carl D. Shoemaker, representative of the state fish commission, made in behalf of E. M. Ries, to turn over to the county and the forestry service part of a tract of land at Eagle Creek on the Columbia River highway, purchased by Ries and associates from the fish commission in May, 1924, for a consideration of \$4,000, should be rejected "as being wholly inadequate and unfair to the people of Oregon," says a report prepared by County Commissioner Taft, one of the members of the commission, appointed by the county board to investigate the transfer of the tract to private ownership.

ANOTHER MONTH FOR BABE RUTH

NEW YORK, April 17.—With the removal of an abscess from Babe Ruth's back this morning, physicians hoped that the home run hitter's condition would improve more rapidly than it has since his return to New York last week.

"The operation was successful," said a statement issued at St. Vincent's Hospital after Ruth had been returned to his room, "and the patient is resting well."

Dr. Edward Kind said Ruth would not be able to leave the hospital for two weeks.

NEW YORK, April 17.—Babe Ruth spent a comfortable night and it was said at St. Vincent's Hospital that he seemed little worried about the operation he is to undergo today for removal of an abscess on his back.

The operation is described as of a minor nature, although it is said that recovery will be slow and that Ruth may not return to play for another month.
