AUTO TOURISTS TO FOUR OUT HUGE GOLDEN STREAM

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Communities near the playgrounds of the nation and along popular motor trails will reap a \$2,500,000,000 crop of tourists gold this year, the American Automobile Association estimated today in predicting automobile industry unprecedented proportions. Declaring its figures were conservative, the association said motor travelers would derive \$1,000,000,000 between Florida and California, with the park regions in the West and New England also bidding for a large share. A 25 per cent increase in the number of long distance tours was forecast.

TRAFFIC HEAD DISCUSSES NEW LIGHTING LAW

that they must observe occasionally when the beams are in correct focus, which is readily done by placing a line on the glare wall or door, the same height as the center of the headlights from the floor, observing whether or not the main intensities are below that line as required.

"All devices used for the control of the beams as required by the Oregon law must be of a type and make such as has been approved by the Secretary of State. At this time there have been no reviews approved, and it might be well for motorists to proceed cautiously in the purchasing of their devices until such a time as the approved list is ready for publication.

Frank A. Pim, the illuminating engineer serving with the traffic division, treated the technical side of the new law, using screens and projection devices to show just what requirements must be met.

"This 8-point test as the law drafts it is rather complicated," he stated, "in fact, too complicated for the average motorist or layman to comprehend. These technical phrases and points, as they are called, are drafted into the law for the purpose of requiring the various device manufacturers, making and selling devices, to so design them that they must meet all the intensity requirements at the 8 positions in front of the car as specified in the law, and in addition pass a practicability and durability test, sufficiently drastic that when a pair of devices is sold and placed upon the car it will be of such a type that it will remain there as long as the car operates upon the highway.

"This law becomes operative after May 28, and after September 1 it shall be unlawful for anyone to sell or offer for sale any new car or motor vehicle not equipped with devices specified by the Secretary of State, and motorists have until that time to make the adjustments required by law. Motorists will not be required to dim their headlights when traveling upon the highways during dry weather, but owing to the conditions of reflection that are evident upon the surface of the highway when it is wet, it was deemed advisable to require the dimming of headlights on wet pavement in passing an approaching car.

"Motorists should remember that the Oregon lighting law specifies a minimum candlepower as well as a maximum intensity for a dim light. These values were placed at 4 candlepower minimum and 12 candlepower maximum. It would therefore be illegal to use a lamp bulb in dimming lights in excess of 12 candlepower. The maximum intensity is 21 candlepower, and it is therefore illegal to use any candle power of lamp bulb higher than 21.

"The base of the adjustment for the 8-point test is a theoretical line, called the line of parallelism, of the line of horizontal, and is a position measured from the center of the headlights on the roadway, and all devices operating under the approval of the 8-point test so deflect the light rays that the beam projections are below this line of horizontal. In other words, the light is converted by the approved device in such a manner that the intensities are below the level of the headlights on the roadway, and above the headlamps the intensities are so modified that they will not obscure the vision of the approaching motorist or car.

"Practically all new cars sold during the last two years have been equipped at the factory with devices which meet these specifications, and it will be only necessary for the owners of these cars to have the required adjustments made.

"It will be illegal for a person to have a spotlight or footlight on the right hand side of the car. These lights should be placed on the left hand side, not less than 8 inches to the left of the axis of the vehicle, and also in be so attached that they cannot be moved without the use of tools. The beam must be directed across to the right hand side, striking the roadway to the right of the center axis and not to exceed 75 feet ahead.

The beam of the spotlight must be so adjusted that when shining on a screen 25 feet distant from the vehicle it will be no larger than 10 inches in diameter."

The meeting held here was the first of its kind in the state. Mr. Jeffrey and Mr. Pim went to Marshfield today, where a similar school will be held. They will give demonstrations in all of the larger points of Southern Oregon, and then go to other sections of the state. The greater part of the campaign will, of course, be taken up in Portland.

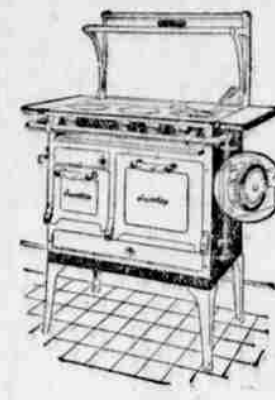
