A. J. Geddes To Return—

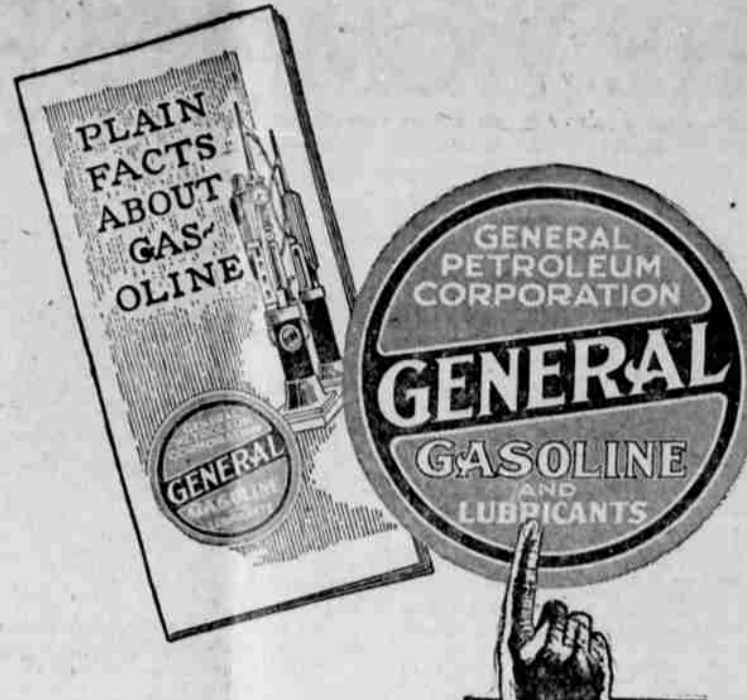
