BOOTLEGGERS' 31ST CASE DRAWS TERM IN PRISON

SPOKANE, Wash., April 18.—Charles Dale, who, according to his attorney has stood trial 29 times on charges of liquor law violations, has been convicted twice and has pleaded guilty once before, but who has served but 29 days and been fined only about \$200, was sentenced to a year and a day in McNeil Island penitentiary today when he pleaded guilty in federal district court here to a charge of conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition laws.

Dale recently professed information and wrote a series of articles for a local newspaper on the bootlegging business, pointing out the folly of law violation. Today he told Federal Judge J. Stanley Webster that his action was in good faith, but that when he lost a good job he returned to liquor ranning.

EXCITING HOLD-UP AND CHASE. LANDS THUG IN HOSPITAL

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., April 18.—After beating and knocking to the floor Mrs. George J. Koller, who resisted him while he was holding up her husband's grocery store here today, a man who gave his name as Lewis W. Crawford, 34 of Los Angeles, was hurled from the store by Mrs. Koller's son, Virgil, and was shot by a patrolman who took part in the chase, the police reported. Crawford is in a hospital with a bullet in his forearm and another in his left hip. Mrs. Koller also was taken to a hospital, but was found to be suffering principally from shock.

When the robber entered the store, according to the police report, he asked for the proprietor. When Mrs. Koller said her husband was out the man pulled a revolver and stepped toward the cash register. Mrs. Koller interposed and was knocked down by a blow on the head. The robber fired two shots through the floor at her feet.

Virgil Koller, 17, turned upon the man, snarling calling him a coward and daring him to shoot. The intruder rushed to the cash register, took some money and dashed from the store, followed by the youth. Two officers nearby took part in the chase, and when the fleeing man turned to fire one of the officers shot him.

THREE WITNESSES TESTIFY AGAINST SENATOR WHEELER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
GREAT FALLS, Mont., April 18.—Further attempts to connect Senator Burton K. Wheeler with proceedings before the Interior department in behalf of Gordon Campbell, Montana oil operator, were made in the trial here today by the government, which called three witnesses to the stand.

L. C. Stevenson of Great Falls, a former associate of Campbell, who later became his rival as an oil operator in the Montana oil fields, was the first witness.

He was permitted to identify copies of the petition for a receivership which he filed against Gordon Campbell-Kevin syndicate number 1, but was barred from answering other questions about it because of objections by Senator Thomas J. Walsh, chief of defense counsel.

Senator Wheeler is charged with having wantonly used his influence before the Interior department in prosecuting all present and prospective applications for Campbell.

E. M. Harvey, a stockholder in the Campbell syndicate, testified he had protested against the payment by the syndicate of a fee of \$10,000 to Wheeler to act as attorney for the syndicate, maintaining it was too high. He declared, however, that the employment of the senator was to defend the receivership and had no connection with government permits.

On cross-examination, Harvey said that Wheeler declared that it only forty-acre tract of land was saved as a result of employment of the senator as an attorney, one fee of \$10,000 would be a good investment for the company.

REFERENDUM TITLE OREGON BUS LINES NOW 'LEVIES TAXES'

SALEM, Ore., April 18.—Modified by the ballot title prepared for the bus bill referendum petitions by Attorney-General Van Winkle, but not granting in full the demand of the petitioners for an alteration of the title, Judge McMahon today handed down an order in the appeal of the Lane and Marion county courts from the Van Winkle ballot title to the circuit court.

The two county courts averred that the ballot title as prepared by Van Winkle stated that the act levies taxes on buses, whereas, according to their petition, "it imposes charges." The McMahon order makes it read, "levy license taxes."

Another contention of the county courts was that the Van Winkle title did not show that the act applies only to common carriers. The order of Judge McMahon brings this out more clearly.

The bus bill passed by the recent legislature is being re-entitled by the bus lines and it was the ballot title to the referendum petitions that was in controversy.
