**GOVERNMENT OF SELF BEST SAYS PRES. COOLIDGE**

The true ideal of self government. The attainment of that ideal lies some distance in the future, but is an ideal toward which we should constantly strive.

"If the people wish to be in full enjoyment of their liberties, if they wish to be unhampered by government restrictions, they can secure that privilege. But they can not secure it by abolishing government. They can only secure it by adopting a thorough system of individual self government. Government is an absolute necessity to human progress and human happiness. If we do not wish to have it imposed from without we must ourselves impose it from within."

The Americanization work of the Daughters of the American Revolution among immigrants was praised by Mr. Coolidge, who declared that the United States' policy of restriction seemed necessary "in view of the certainty that unprecedented numbers would flow to us from Europe; more than

we could be sure of assimilating, more than European countries could dwell upon."

moved throughout the demonstration, even when a group on the right at the mention of the word "justice" kept shouting: "High court, high court for Caillaux."

The hasty alterations in the internal declaration were apparent in the copies distributed when the reading started. The appeal for unity had been inserted and modifications made in the passages about the army, the Vatican and the discussion regarding Alsace-Lorraine.

The Poincaré declaration promised hearty support for the League of Nations and advocated that all countries be made members, this referring to Germany.

**DUNCAN SLUGS OFFICER—ESCAPES**

to hide behind them near the entrance, the light being so poor that the officer is at a disadvantage as he enters.

Duncan took advantage of this situation, an expert for the fact that the blow was not heavy enough to knock the officer unconscious, he would have escaped without any great effort. Several times following such cases, the county court has considered altering the jail to admit more light, and to give greater safety, but nothing has ever been done, even in the face of numerous grand jury reports insisting that the changes be made.

Duncan had apparently intended to take his coat and hat after knocking the officer out, but when he failed to accomplish the desired result with his first blow, he fled without these garments. He also probably intended to take a revolver from the officer, but persons entering the jail are careful not to carry arms with them, as one officer several years ago was badly beaten with his own revolver.

The fleeing prisoner ran around the corner of the jail, across the court house yard and down North Main street hill to Deer Creek. Officers who immediately took up the search found his tracks leading to a point opposite the I. O. O. F. cemetery, where he was seen by residents crossing the road. He went up the hill and into hiding there, the trees and shrubs affording him perfect cover.

Officers all over the county have been notified of the escape, and are on the lookout for the man. It is probable that he will not be located until he comes out for food, as he can keep in hiding in the hills for days without being seen.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon word was received from Glengary that a man answering Duncan's description had been seen near the school house. The man was reported to be without coat or hat, and was wet and bedraggled, and apparently tired from a long run or hike through the woods. A posse of officers headed by Sheriff Starmer, left at once for the scene after notifying residents to watch the direction taken by the man and to halt him and hold him, if possible, until officers could reach the place.

Duncan, or Harper, as he is also known, has a bad record behind him. He was arrested in Portland and sent to the penitentiary February 18, 1924, and sentenced to one year on a charge of forgery. He escaped October 15, '24, and was later picked up in San Francisco and returned to the pen. Sheriff Starmer was warned by Warden Dalrymple, that the man is a bad actor, that the prison official stating that he was overwrought, refusing to obey the prison rules without force, unwilling to work, and otherwise causing trouble. He was once apprehended in the act of tunneling under the prison walls, but the escape was prevented.

In an effort to recapture the escaped prisoner, officers are searching all points, where he is apt to appear. Sheriff Starmer, taking no chances, today prepared for a long search for the man by sending to the penitentiary for pictures and information to use for posters.
