### SCHOOL BOARD TO RECEIVE FINAL PLANS AT NEXT MEETING

The school board held a lengthy session last night, the meeting being largely devoted to a discussion of the tentative plans and specifications submitted by Architect Gerow. Mr. Gerow expects to have the detailed plans completed by the time of the board's next meeting in two weeks, and the board hopes to advertise for bids immediately following the adoption of the plans. The matter of providing heat for the building is causing considerable discussion. Electric heating plants have been submitted to the board for tests and investigation, and it is possible that these portable units will be adopted. If such is the case the installation cost will be reduced about \$5,000.

The board accepted the application of Miss Katherine Blitney for a position on the high school teaching staff, and she will be assigned to the English department. Miss Blitney is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College, and comes well recommended.

The board also decided upon the supplies to be needed for the coming year and will determine the prices which must be paid for the supplies found necessary.

### METHODIST VOTE TO UNITE IS 'YES' OVERWHELMINGLY

 CHICAGO, April 22.—Twenty-seven conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church have voted 2420 to 241 in favor of unification of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, according to figures announced today by Dr. E. J. Wade, secretary of the general conference of the Northern church.

Only two conferences of the Southern church have voted on the proposition, the Cuban conference having voted unanimously for unification, while the Baltimore conference voted against it. There are 37 conferences in the Southern church yet to take action.

In the Northern church, five spring conferences and 73 conferences which meet next fall, remain to be heard from. Of the 27 conferences which have balloted, the vote of the Wyoming conference of Pennsylvania, which acted on April 17, has not yet been received.

### WORLD'S LARGEST DANCE HALL DESTROYED BY FIRE

 SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 22.—Salt Air Resort, on the Great Salt Lake, 20 miles west of here and nationally famous, was reported afire late this afternoon. Flames were visible from here and the county fire department has been dispatched to the scene.

At 2:35 o'clock it was reported that practically the entire resort had been destroyed and that the flames had spread to the roof of the dance pavilion, which is declared to be the largest of its kind in the world.

The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is said to have originated in a restaurant known as the Ship Cafe.
