FIERY CROSSES AT DES MOINES KEEP FIRE DEPT. BUSY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
DES MOINES, Ia., April 23.—Simultaneous burning here last night of fiery crosses in various parts of the city, including the state capitol grounds, aroused in one section a number of negroes who threatened the lives of two alleged Ku Klux Klan policemen and resulted in fire alarms that kept the fire department busy answering calls from residents who feared burning embers carried by high winds, would cause damage. 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APOSTATE BISHOP TALKS AS COPS HOLD BACK CROWD

NEW YORK, April 23.—In the robes of the bishopric, Bishop William Montgomery Brown, twice convicted by the ecclesiastical courts of heresy, defied his belief from the pulpit of the Community Church in New York last night, while outside the church police reserves held back the overflow crowd.
Bishop Brown said he was delivering the address he had prepared for last Sunday at St. Marks-in-the-Bowery. Bishop William T. Manning of the New York Episcopal Diocese inhibited him from delivering it in an Episcopal Church of the Diocese, in restraining Dr. Guthrie, rector of St. Marks, from permitting Bishop Brown to speak there.
Bishop Brown explained that he had entirely abandoned supernaturalistic theology and interpreted the bible as allegorical and idealistic expression when it dealt with events unacceptable in the light of modern scientific progress.
