KING PRISONER REPORTS; ANOTHER TERRORIST SLAIN

ROME, April 23. — A dispatch from Belgrade to the Tribune says that King Boris of Bulgaria has been imprisoned in the Royal Palace by the order of General Lazareff because the nationalists military element objected to the Sovereign's request that Premier Tsankoff resign to permit the formation of a coalition cabinet, including opposition elements.

Another dispatch from Belgrade, but sent by way of Vienna, declares that Jugo-Slavia, offended by Minister of Interior Russoff's declaration before the Bulgarian national assembly regarding the activities of the Jugo-Slav legion at Sofia, has demanded an explanation, and is threatening to break off diplomatic relations.

Another Terrorist Slain. SOFIA, April 23. — The revolutionist Teboutouloff, one of the principal terrorists under Nikoff, the alleged communist leader in the recent Cathedral bomb outrage, who was shot and killed by the police Monday, met death today in much the same manner as his chief. Discovered by the police, he refused to surrender, they declare, and was shot down.

CARL SHOEMAKER DEAL UP TO GOVERNOR PIERCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., April 23. — District Attorney Stanley Myers announced today he would recommend that the county commission ask Governor Walter Pierce to investigate the recent sale by the state fish commission of 20 acres of land at Eagle Creek to E. M. Ries. Ries has offered to turn over to Multnomah county and the forest service all of the tract but 100 by 100 feet on which he desires to establish a concession including a restaurant, confectionery and camper's supply store.

The tract involved was sold by the state fish commission to Ries for \$4000, but the deed has not been recorded. The first knowledge the county board had of the sale was when Carl D. Shoemaker, acting general manager of the commission, appeared before it and told them he was manager of the tract and proposed erecting a refreshment stand. Shoemaker had understood the county had objections to such a building.

WRESTLING TITLE IS UNDETERMINED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, April 23. — Prolongation of the dispute as to who is the world's heavy-weight wrestling champion, was seen today in plans to match Ed "Strangler" Lewis and Wayne "Big" Munn for a go in the open air arena at Michigan City, Ind., May 26, with the diamond studded belt, emblematic of the title, and still held by Lewis, at stake. Although the veteran Stanislaus Zbyszko carries the title as the result of his defeat of Munn at Philadelphia, Munn previously had refused to

turn the belt over to Munn, when the giant Nebraska took his measure at Kansas City, in January, on the ground that Munn should have been disqualified for foul tactics in tossing him from the ring.

Billy Sandow, representing Lewis, is authority for the statement that the diamond championship belt will be at stake. The veteran Pole, in meeting his opponents in eastern cities, is believed in some quarters to have aligned himself with what is known as the "Eastern wrestling trust" with Lewis and Munn holding allegiance to the western trust. If such is the case, the easterners have the title and the westerners the belt with the outcome of the dispute a matter for the future to decide.

BOXER IN FATAL BOUT EXONERATED AT THE INQUEST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, April 23.—A coroner's jury yesterday exonerated Bobby Allen of any part in the death of Harry Simone, Boston boxer, who died here last Saturday night of congestion of the brain, after he had fought Allen in a San Bernardino ring the previous Thursday.

Histrict Attorney Johnson of San Bernardino county said he would go over the records in the case to try to determine whether Simone's death might have produced the ruptured artery in his brain that accompanied the congestion.

Allen, who is at liberty on his own recognizance, will have his preliminary hearing at San Bernardino, April 28.
