SHOCKED BY EARTHQUAKE (Associated Press Local Wire.) PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 24.—New Bedford, Mass., police headquarters reported today that a distinct earth shock had been felt in this city at 2:55 p. m. The officer in charge said that there was a rumbling underneath and that the shock lasted the greater part of 20 seconds.

BOSTON, April 24.—Distinct

earth tremors were reported today from several points in southeastern Massachusetts. At Middleboro the phenomenon was timed 3 o'clock. No damage was reported. The movement was felt as far inland as Brockton and appeared to follow a line between New Bedford and that city. In Brockton Heights, a suburb, windows and dishes were rattled. The duration of the shocks were reported as being from a few seconds to a half a minute.

WAR MENACES

BALKANS OVER SOFIA AFFAIR (Continued from page 1.) abandons suspicion of Jugo-Slav complicity in the campaign of terrorism in Bulgaria. Jugo-Slav officials deny that assistance has been given Bulgarian assassins.

Sofia dispatches quote Minister

of the Interior Rousseff as declaring that not over 1500 persons have been arrested throughout Bulgaria during the campaign against terrorists. He asserts that Moscow furnished arms and money for the subversives.

Premier Trankoff declared

the situation attributable to the British labor party members recently in Sofia that many had been killed in Bulgaria without trial is "other calumny." He declared the situation is calm throughout the country.

Other indirect dispatches, however,

continue to report that King Boris of Bulgaria, is virtually a prisoner in the Royal Palace at Sofia under General Lazareff, head of the military junta.

Sofia continues aptly under virtual

martial law. The Bulgarian militia is being increased as authorized by the council of ambassadors at Paris, to cope with the situation and Roumanian, Jugo-Slav and Greek are protesting that increase.

Neighbors Move to Protect

BERLIN, April 24.—A dispatch from Athens reports that an agent of the Greek government is enroute to Belgrade to resist negotiations for an alliance between Greece and Jugo-Slavia.

The Greek premier is quoted as

saying that the Athens government has no intention of intervening in the Bulgarian situation unless the Greek frontiers are threatened. The premier, nevertheless, be-

loves, it is added, that an enlarged Bulgarian army is likely to cause unrest in the mind of the Greek people who will view it as a menace of the status quo in the Balkans. PARIS, April 24.—Le Matin Sofia correspondent says reports of a change in the Bulgarian cabinet are absolutely unfounded. The ministry under Premier Trankoff is stronger than ever, he declared. Terrorist Slain; Arms Found SOFIA, April 24.—Ivan Manoff, a member of the secret committee of the Bulgarian communist party, was shot and killed by the police today when he refused to surrender. Another store of arms has been found by the police in a search of the home of a suspected conspirator. General Rousseff, the minister of the interior, told foreign correspondents today that the number of those arrested in the entire country since the beginning of the government campaign against the terrorists did not exceed 1,500. He declared that Moscow had industrialists and bands in its pay on regular monthly wages in Bulgaria and gave special premiums for crimes committed. A campaign of calumny against Bulgaria was carried on, he charged, by agrarian communists, who had gone from this country to Jugo-Slavia and at the same time, Macedonian and Thracian refugees, expelled from their homes, formed an element of disorder in Bulgaria.
