CHERRY GROWERS HOLD MEETING

A number of cherry growers met at the City Hall this afternoon for the purpose of discussing plans for the forthcoming market. The meeting was arranged by County Agent H. W. Conroy, for the purpose of securing facts on the amount of the crop for this year, to make plans for handling, packing standards, and uniform labels. It is planned to establish a centralized market in order to get the best possible price. C. J. Hurd, market specialist from the Oregon Agricultural College, gave a comparison of prices showing that the growers of the Prosser district received the best prices getting 20 cents per pound, while the Dallas growers received 12 to 14 cents and Roseburg 8 to 12 cents. Salem growers received slightly less. Roseburg growers receive as much as the Dallas growers, Mr. Hurd said.

The growers contemplated concerted action in handling this year's crop in order that the best possible price may be secured. It is believed that there will be about the same amount of cherries as last year, when seven carloads were shipped out.
