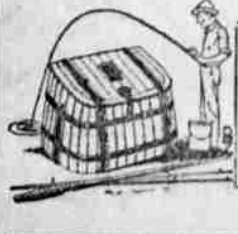

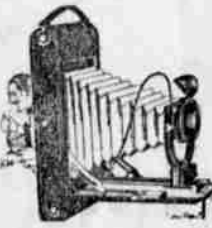

WATER TOO COLD TO COMMIT SUICIDE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SPOKANE, Wash., April 27.—H. George Smith, a woods worker, aged 42, was recovering from three attempts to take his life which were terminated when the chilly waters of a mill pond here

gave sudden birth in his mind of a desire to live.

Smith told police he had become despondent from drink and had decided early yesterday to commit suicide. He cut his throat, but still lived, then slashed his wrists, but found that ineffective, and then walked several blocks from his hotel to a mill pond and jumped in. The cold water gave him different notion and he set a convenient log and called for help.

After an all night rest in jail, his view upon life was reported as considerably improved.

SHEPHERD WILL BE TRIED MAY 18

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, April 27.—William D. Shepherd, charged with the murder of William Nelson McClintock, his foster son, from whom he inherited a \$1,000,000 estate will be tried May 18 before Judge Lynch. The trial date was set after both sides expressed willingness to go to trial as soon as possible. Dr. C. C. Falman, upon whose confession Shepherd was indicted for murder and a co-defendant with Shepherd, did not appear in court, although his case was set automatically with that of Shepherd. Falman is at liberty on \$100,000 bond; signed by two policemen of the state's attorney's office without a schedule of property. The state probably will ask that Falman be given a separate trial. HANEY CONFERS WITH COOLIDGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, April 26.—Commissioner Haney of the shipping board, whose continuance as a board member has been a subject of speculation, conferred with President Coolidge today and gave the executive a detailed report of the negotiations for the sale of the president type ships in the Pacific to the Dollar interests.

Haney who was a member of the committee favoring the sale will retire in June unless reappointed for another term. He is a democrat from Oregon and under the law, either he or some other democrat from a northwestern state must be named. Reappointment of Mr. Haney has been urged by Senator McNary, republican of Oregon, and there have been indications recently that President Coolidge would retain him on the board.

Afterwards Mr. Haney said the president had "indicated a willingness, even a desire, to reappoint me." He added that, no conclusion was reached.

TWO KILLED IN ELECTION FIGHT

NOGALES, Ariz., April 27.—Election day fights cost the lives of two men in Nogales. The dead are Alvaro Valencia and Liberato Castro. Both were shot.

The election is believed to have resulted in the naming of Dr. Fernando Priego, red candidate, to the office of "president" or mayor of Nogales, Sonora, although the ballots have not been counted. The ballots are kept in glass bowls and observers say that the red ballots predominate over the red and green cast for the opposing candidate, Jesus Tejada.

Officials of the Mexican City say that charges will be filed against Jejerina, alleging that he attempted to storm the polling place and take the ballots cast.

Jesus Gutierrez, also known as "El Chino," has been placed under arrest and is charged with the slaying of Valencia. Police are searching for the one who is believed to have shot Castro.

VALUABLE FURS STOLEN BY GANG

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, April 27.—Thousands of dollars worth of furs and other apparel of women was stolen from Livingston Brothers department store here last night by three men who bound and gagged the night watchman and two janitors. A woman is believed to have aided in the robbery, soiled clothing having been found in a dressing room and presumably replaced with store finery.
