MONARCHY MAY BE RESTORED BY HINDENBURG

German security pact offer will be conducted on the same policy of avoiding anything that could be used as fuel for the reactionary campaign in Germany. Foreign Minister Briand will soon reply to the offer of Dr. Stresemann, the German foreign minister in such a way as to encourage possible continuation of the efforts toward an agreement, it was indicated, but without giving the hope that France will abandon her allies, Poland and Czechoslovakia with their vital interest in the question of Germany's eastern border which that nation desires to re-open eventually.

BERLIN, April 28.—The victory of the nationalists in the presidential election has been closely followed by the resumption of the band concerts in the public squares as was customary in the days of monarchy and which constituted chiefly of the rendition of patriotic airs.

At the Wittenburg plaza yesterday afternoon, the band played the "Army March Number 9," the "Kaiser Waltz" by Strauss, the "Wreath of the Kaiser," "Black, White and Red," Imperial flag song and "Deutschland Uber Alles."

VIENNA, April 28.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's election to the German presidency is regarded here as a serious blow to the idea of an Austrian union with Germany and is deplored by the newspapers of all parties.

The Neue Freie press while hoping for the best, characterizes it as a misfortune for the German people, while the Abend declares: "Von Hindenburg's is a victory of European discord over the Dawes plan and the London agreements."

HANOVER, Germany, April 28.—The aged helmet monarchist organizations seem to have taken possession of Hanover and are celebrating exultantly the election of Von Hindenburg. At their favorite restaurants and cafes members of these monarchist groups are yelling themselves hoarse day and night shouting "Hail, Hindenburg" singing patriotic songs and imbibing freely.
