FOREST WEEK SET ASIDE IN EFFORT TO STOP WASTE

American Forest Week has been set aside by Presidential Proclamation as a time to bring to the attention of the American people the facts concerning the vast unnecessary wastage of our forests by fire, wasteful manufacturing operations, and failure to keep America's forest land at work growing three crops. The Governors of many states will issue proclamations supplementing the one issued by President Coolidge. American Forest Week is an outgrowth of Forest Protection Week which originated on the Pacific Coast six years ago. It quickly grew to national proportions and in 1921 President Harding issued a Proclamation which placed the Federal Government in general, and the Forest Service in particular, squarely behind the movement. President Harding issued Proclamation again in 1922 and 1923. Last year President Coolidge issued a Proclamation.

TRIBESMEN ENTER FRENCH MOROCCO

PARIS, April 29.—Mohammed, brother of Abd-el-Krim, Moroccan rebel leader, has entered the French zone of Morocco at the head of a big tribal contingent, according to official information received by the French government. Marshal Lyautey, governor of French Morocco, has sent a regiment of reinforcements but it is stated that the French will not attack the tribesmen unless provoked.

S. P. TO BUILD 18 MAMMOTH ENGINES

Eighteen powerful locomotives, specially designed to haul heavy passenger trains over steep mountain grades are being built in the Southern Pacific Company's own shops at Sacramento. So it was made known today by J. H. Dyer, general manager of the company. The engines will cost \$1,467,720. Dyer also points out that from preliminary plans to completion the locomotives will be Southern Pacific products and that at least 60 per cent of the cost will represent wages. "The decision to build these engines in our Sacramento shops," said Dyer, "is as important to the Pacific coast as the establishment of a new industry."

S. P. TO BUILD 18 MAMMOTH ENGINES

The driving wheels, 4 pairs of them, will be 73 inches in diameter. Engine and tender will be 92 feet 8 1/2 inches long. The engines will be equipped with boosters—the device that takes the jerk out of starting—super heaters and feed water heaters. The engines will have two cylinders of 28-inch diameter and 30 inch stroke. Main and side rods will be of vanadium steel, the great tensile strength of which makes it possible to use rods of light weight. On a grade of 26 feet to the mile one of these engines will draw a passenger train of 14 cars 50 miles an hour or a freight train of 75 loaded cars at 10 miles an hour. Seven of the new locomotives will be completed this year and will be placed in operation on mountain divisions.

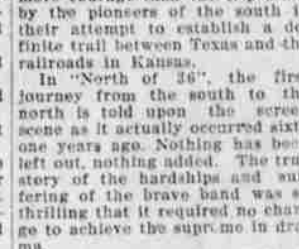
SALVATION ARMY FORMS ORGANIZATION FOR YOUNG PEOPLE OF THE CITY
