The school board met last night in its regular session and spent several hours in the consideration of routine business. The applications of a large number of teachers for positions in the local schools were considered and their credentials and qualifications given careful consideration. Miss Verna Luther, of Springfield, was employed to serve as an instructor in the grade schools during the coming year. Miss Edna E. Sanbloom, a graduate of Linfield college, will be a member of the high school faculty the board decided.

H. M. Stone, who has had the contract for transporting the children from Edgewater to the Benson school, was given a continuation of his contract over the school year starting in the fall.

A letter was read from the E. H.
