## POPULATION OF U. S. INCREASES VIA BIRTH RATE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The rate of increase of the nation's population by birth was considerably greater in 1924 than in 1923.

While the birthrate increased from 22.3 per 1,000 in 1923 to 22.5 per 1,000 in 1924, the death rate decreased during the period from 12.4 to 11.9 per 1,000.

A census bureau survey made public today showed the highest birth rate in the country to be 21.9 per 1,000 in the rural districts of North Carolina, while the lowest rate 14.9 per 1,000 was found in the rural districts of Montana.

The death rate was lower in 1924 than in 1923 in 23 of the 29 states covered by the survey. Infant mortality rates were shown to be generally lower in 1924 than in 1923, increases being noted in only three states. The 1924 rates per one thousand, of population of births and deaths were shown to be for California 22 and 14.5; Montana 16.1 and 7.5; Nebraska 21.5 and 9; Oregon 18.6 and 11.3; Washington 17.4 and 10 and Wyoming 24 and 9.5.

## PRUSSIA TRAIN WRECK KILLS 30

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

STARGARD, Prussia, May 1.—It is not yet explained whether the wreck today of the Eydtkuhnen-Berlin express near here, in which from thirty to forty were killed and about forty injured was caused by accidental derailment or was the act of political malcontents. Some color is given to the latter theory by the fact that a Russian economic commission headed by Dr. Markoff, director of the Russian economic institute for the Baltic states, was aboard the train.

Patriarch Tikhon, former head of the Orthodox Church of All-Russia, once sentenced to death by the Soviets for alleged counter-revolution, is dead in Moscow. He served his church in America from 1898 until 1906. London hears that Senator Guglielmo Marconi, of Italy, world-renowned wireless inventor, is soon to marry Miss Elizabeth Narcissa Paynter, eighteen-year-old girl of Esquimaux, Cornwall, England, whose father commands the crack Scots Guards. The British Consul in Paris has refused to marry Lady Sholto Douglas to Prince Burhaddin, eldest son of former Sultan Abdul Hamid, on the grounds she is no longer a British subject. Lady Sholto is the divorced wife of Lord Douglas. George S. Dougherty, former Deputy Police Commissioner of New York City, and noted crime expert, was one of a party of six held up and robbed of all their possessions in Los Angeles, Cal.
