REFERENDUM ON BUS LAW MEETS WITH OPPOSITION

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce has received from the Dalles-Wasco County Chamber of Commerce copy of resolution passed by them on April 28, 1925, reading as follows:

WHEREAS, the last Legislature of the State of Oregon passed a measure known as House Bill 413, which had for its purpose the regulation of commercial motor vehicles and the fixing of a reasonable charge or tax for the use of the highways of the State of Oregon by said commercial motor vehicles, and

WHEREAS, it is generally known that commercial trucks and busses cause more damage and injury to the highways of the State of Oregon, which have been constructed at large cost and expense to the taxpayers, than all other forms of transportation, and

WHEREAS, we believe, that said trucks and busses should be required to pay a reasonable charge for the purpose of repairing in part, the great damage and injury that they are doing to said highways, and

WHEREAS, it is the consensus of opinion that the rates fixed by said House Bill 413 are fair, just and equitable, and should be paid by those who are using our expensive highways for commercial purposes, which said highways are only maintained by means of fees and special licenses and taxes, and

WHEREAS, certain interests are causing the circulation of petitions for the purpose of invoking the referendum upon said House Bill 413 which would prevent the same from becoming operative and effective until after November 24, which action would enable bus and truck operators for commercial purposes to damage and injure the highways of the State of Oregon for a period of two years, without making just compensation therefor or repairing the great damage and injury which they are doing.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE Dalles-Wasco County Chamber of Commerce that we disapprove the actions of those who are engaged in the effort to invoke the referendum upon said House Bill 413, and earnestly urge upon everyone the duty of refusing to sign such petition and using every effort and all influence possible in order to defeat the designs and purposes of those who are responsible for said efforts to invoke the referendum upon said House Bill 413.

At the next meeting of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, the request made by The Dalles-Wasco Chamber that similar resolutions be adopted, will be considered.

The members of the Roseburg country club who are to go to Marshfield on Sunday to meet the members of the Marshfield club in a tournament, are urged to leave Roseburg not later than 5 a. m., Sunday morning, and if possible get on the Coos Bay course in time to practice for a short time before the match starts.
