ACID-THROWER IS FOUND GUILTY

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
LOS ANGELES, May 5.—One to fourteen years in San Quentin penitentiary loomed ahead of Mrs. Bernice Lundstrom today as the result of her conviction in superior court yesterday of throwing acid into the face of her husband, Darby Day, Jr., during a domestic quarrel in Beverly Hills last February. Sentence will be pronounced Thursday.

Young Day, the son of a Chicago capitalist, was not in court when the jury returned; had he been there he would have seen his wife take the verdict without blinking an eyelash, without even a small display of emotion.

Carlyn Lundstrom, who was tried with her sister as an accomplice in the acid throwing, was acquitted.

Defense counsel predicted the case would be appealed.

MODOC LUMBER CO. MILL IS BURNED

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 5.—The mill of the Modoc Lumber Company was completely destroyed by fire early last night with a loss of approximately \$150,000. Fire started when sparks from a hot box ignited in sawdust, and the flames spread so rapidly that mill employees were unable to control it. The lumber yard and office buildings were saved.

The mill and equipment are a total loss, according to V. D. C. Beach, manager. The loss was nearly completely covered by insurance.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—L. B. Mezeio, of the L. B. Mezeio Lumber Company, said today when asked whether the mill of the Modoc Lumber Company would be rebuilt: "It is uncertain, but the mill probably will be rebuilt. It is impossible to make any definite announcement just yet."

MADISON SQUARE TO HOUSE LAST THROUG TONIGHT

NEW YORK, May 5.—Madison square Garden, scene of notable sporting events for more than three decades, will house its last throng tonight. Immediately after a 12-round fight between Johnny Dundee, veteran of more than 3,000 rounds of fighting and Ed Terrie, youthful lightweight aspirant for New York's east side. The giant claws of a wrecker will begin to rip down the old amphitheatre. Among the relics that will pass with the razing of the garden on Wednesday will be John Sullivan, a night caretaker, who for 32 years has seen the champions come and go. Sullivan, who said he had not missed a single night's work since he entered upon his long assignment, asserted that of all the thrilling struggles he had ever seen, that between Peter Maher

and Gus Rublin topped the list. "It was the bloodiest battle ever staged in New York," declared the ancient caretaker. "The eyes of both men were closed in the middle of the fray and how they ever lasted it out, I could never understand."

BANK ROBBERS BATTLE AND GET \$2300 IN CASH

HARTFORD CITY, Ind., May 5.—Holding off citizens for more than an hour with gun fire, bank robbers today blew open the safe at the Eaton State Bank, obtained \$2300 and escaped.

Seven charges of explosives were used, according to reports received here, wrecking the bank safe. Citizens who rushed from their beds to the scene were driven back by gun fire. The firing continued at intervals for more than an hour.

RUM ROW FIGHT SOON WILL START

NEW YORK, May 5.—Twenty-one boats of the United States Coast Guard steamed out of Clinton Bay, Staten Island base, this morning, bound for Rum Row to open an offensive, which will seek to sweep the liquor armada off the Atlantic seaboard by June 1.

Six of the dry navy's speediest cutters led the force, the Seneca, Redwing, Gresham, Yamacraw, Manhattan and Aconshel.

Behind them were 15 smaller craft, converted submarine chasers and patrol boats, all liberally sprinkled with guns and most of them capable of high speed.

Inconvenient "Currency"

First Coinage of Silver

Silver was first coined on the Isle of Aegina. Here the ancient Greeks stamped a turtle on their first silver coins over 700 years before the Christian era. The first silver coins in the United States were issued by the Massachusetts colony, which minted small silver coins, familiarly known as the pine-tree shillings. The mint was closed by order of the crown in 1684. The first coins made by the United States government were dated 1793.

Color Blindness Permanent
