OBSCENE MAGAZINES BARRIED FROM SALE

SPOKANE, May 6.—Collection from news stands of magazines, ordered suppressed by County Prosecutor Charles Levy as obscene and indecent, was being continued here today by wholesale news dealers who took up copies of nearly twenty publications from a few stands yesterday.

Magazines, which contain pictures and drawings of women in scanty attire and jokes declared questionable will be collected from all news stands in the city during the remainder of the week the prosecutor announced.

Objections to the magazines centered on pictures printed on the covers and also in connection with jokes and short stories, it was said. The action of the prosecutor follows passage of a resolution by the recent convention of the Finland Empire Education Association here condemning the circulation of such publications.

Mr. Levy announced that he would prosecute in the case of further sales of the magazines but he declined to announce any details of his plans. Curtailment of circulation by the distributors will shut off sales of the magazines the prosecutor believes.

FRANCE MAKES A FRIENDLY MOVE TOWARD GERMANY

GENEVA, May 6.—France made a friendly gesture to Germany at the opening of today's session of the conference on the control of traffic in arms, when M. Paul Boncour moved that the steering committee of the conference be enlarged from seven to nine members, so that all sections of the world might be represented, particularly non-members of the league of nations. Germany, chiefly as a result of this motion, now is represented on the committee. Representative Theodore E. Burton, head of the American delegation, received the highest number of votes for a place on the committee.

GENEVA, May 6.—(Arms conference.)—A statement printed by Geneva newspapers quoting Senator Borah of Idaho as having declared that only force remained to be employed if France fails to take steps to pay her war debts, was one of the chief topics of conversation today among the delegates to the conference for the control of traffic in arms. The statement attributed to Senator Borah caused so much comment that it is understood an effort will be made to determine officially whether the Idaho senator was correctly quoted here.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The statement by Senator Borah which caused a commotion in Geneva apparently was a translation of some general observations made by the senator in the course of a copyrighted article in the Washington Sunday Star.

After discussing the French debt and commenting generally on "present conditions and tendencies," the senator said:

"If the most solemn and binding obligations are to be disregarded and especially upon matters of mere material interests, there is no alternative in international affairs but force. There will either be a reign of law or a reign of violence. Of course these reflections are not for France alone. I am speaking generally—disregard of treaties is just as prevalent as disregard of law. While if France fails to meet her debt obligations, the United States debates whether she will live up to her treaty and century of earnest teachings relative to the confiscation of the property of foreigners. Both attitudes are astounding—a doctrine of shame and violence, repudiation and confiscation, the creed of communists."

Senator Borah said today this was the only statement he had made on the subject.

ESKIMO TO WED VICTIM'S WIFE

EDMONTON, Alberta, May 6.—The young Copper Eskimo, Ikalkhiak, will be taken back to tribesmen by Royal Canadian Mounted Police this summer from Stone Mountain penitentiary where he is serving a term for manslaughter, to marry the wife of the man he killed.

The drama of primitive passions which resulted in his imprisonment, centered around Havougach, 40, his wife, Khattia, 26, and Ikalkhiak, 27, all Copper Eskimos living inland about 100 miles from R. C. M. P. post in Coronation Gulf.

Havougach and Khattia being childless, took Ikalkhiak to live with them when he was a youth. He grew to manhood possessing the cardinal virtues of the Eskimo, fearless in hunting and skill in fishing.

Havougach was given to sullenness and sudden outbursts of anger. His young wife was not slow to see the contrast between the two men.

Her husband's jealousy was aroused. One day when the two men went out to bring deer meat from a cache some miles away, according to Ikalkhiak, Havougach threatened to shoot him and for a moment they faced each other. Ikalkhiak armed only with a knife.

Then Havougach, afraid to shoot dropped his rifle and walked away. His antagonist, feeling that he must kill or be killed, picked up the gun and ended the husband's life. Then he surrendered to the police. Since he was sentenced last summer Khattia has been waiting for him at Shell Island. According to the Eskimo law he must support her for killing her husband.

The radio station will broadcast to the Arctic the news that Ikalkhiak is returning. The prisoner served only five months of a five year sentence.
