FOSTER BUTNER HAS A THING OR TWO TO SAY OF U. S. CHAMBER COMMERCE

Roseburg, Ore., May 7.—To the Editor: It is a pleasure to know that the readers of your paper may at all times, regardless of the effect such editorials may have upon your finances, receive information concerning the true condition of affairs pertaining to community, state, and nation.

The present policy of Big Business seems to be the silencing of any kind of criticism. They assert that criticism—no matter how friendly—encourages the spirit of anarchy overlooking entirely the fact that their own political policy has brought into being the spirit of anarchy and radicalism.

It has been only by the free of discussion and criticism, of speech and of free press, that our country has become a leader among nations, but in the eyes of Big Business we have reached the stage of perfection where improvement is impossible.

Personally, I have a high regard, and deep admiration, for the successful man, especially those—and they are many—who have started at the bottom and climbed to the top, or some where near the top, of the ladder.

At the present time the high cost of transportation is one of the greatest problems confronting the American farmer, especially those on the Pacific Coast. Mr. Clagstone is championing the candidacy of one of the officials of the Southern Pacific Company as a director of the U. S. Chamber. When I asked him why agriculture was not represented upon the directorate of his organization he acknowledged that in planning the U. S. Chamber the founders of the body had decided not to include agriculture, so we have the fine exhibition of this national organization comprising the wealthiest business men in the land, proclaiming from the housetop as well as before local Chambers of Commerce and Civic Clubs their great love for the American farmer, while at the same time they have denied him membership in the organization.

Transportation has simply proven its ability to take care of itself, yet the U. S. Chamber of Commerce has welcomed it into its sanctum, and its western manager covers his territory trying to help elect Paul Shoup as director. Agriculture, bankrupt, hungry and tired, has had the door slammed in its face.

brought into play from unexpected quarters whenever a guard patrol appears near shore or travels into one of the thousands of bays and inlets along the gulf coast.

Commander Yeandle, assistant to Admiral Billard said today the anonymous letters had conveyed information indicating that certain officers and men of the coast guard are on a "death list" of the rum runners and that other especially efficient guardmen are to be incapacitated if possible.

Boatswain Pearson of the Atlantic City station was kidnapped May 3 while on his way to join a patrol boat at the station. He was bound and gagged but later released on the outskirts of the city when the kidnappers found they had mistaken him for another. The man believed to be wanted by the rum runners has been warned by the commandant to take extraordinary precautions.

Boatswain Gustafson was another victim of the rum war. He was shot and killed from ambush two weeks ago off Block Island, New London. Threats previously had been made against his life. Officials here believe the patrol of which he was in charge was decoyed by a rum runner on the fatal trip and led past another rum runner which opened up a salvo of much gun fire from ambush. Two others of the crew secured six wounds.

Other cases have been reported to headquarters in which officers and men have returned to their homes to find that mysterious visitors had terrorized their families. This is said by Mr. Yeandle to be particularly true around New York.
