COUNCIL OF WOMEN IS WITHOUT FUND

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Passing from a series of unscheduled and harrassing events, the convention of the international council of women came to grips today with another perplexing situation, disclosed in a report that the councils finances are at ebb tide.

The delegates had before them the treasurers statement and a report by the finance committee along with recommendations that revenue be provided from additional sources.

Removal of peace literature from among exhibits in the convention auditorium basement remained a live topic of conversation, refreshed by a statement in behalf of Mrs. Henry Villard of New York, chairman of the women's peace society that the exhibit was placed with the permission of a convention committee chairman. The publications urged total and immediate disarmament.

Newspaper accounts of the convention were criticized by L. S. Rowe, director general of the Pan-American Union, who addressed the delegates last night. The press in Washington, he said, "in an unfortunate attempt to be witty has utterly misconstrued your larger purposes."

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt described the reception of the visitors as "inhospitable and discourteous" and declared "an apology and an explanation is due you."
