OREGON WHEAT CROP BADLY INJURED BY WINTER WEATHER

Not for practically a score of years has the weather damage to the Oregon Winter Wheat crop been so severe as that of the past winter, says F. L. Kent, State Statistician.

"Old timers" report that in 1906 damage to the wheat crop was even more severe than during the fall of 1924.

The damage was most severe in the counties of Sherman, Gilliam and Morrow, where it is estimated that about 95 per cent of the fall seeded acreage was winter-killed.

The unusual loss appears to have been due to a lack of snow covering. Lower temperatures have prevailed other winters with no very large loss.

Weather conditions to date have been very favorable for spring sown wheat, including the reseeded areas.

While May 1 is rather too early to be lighter than usual due to crop it may be said that small fruits are very considerably from the winter cold.

The United States winter wheat crops show further decline in prospects from April 5, 1925.
