## ROSEBURG HIGH SCHOOL SENDS THE BEST DELEGATION

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 11.—Roseburg high school rated first in numbers among high schools of the state at the Smith-Hughes week-end for high schools, May 8 and 9, at O. A. C. planned and sponsored by the agricultural club.

Of the 230 high school students attending the week-end, Roseburg sent 24 besides the instructor, H. M. Moreland, and R. A. Smith, an interested farmer. It is planned to make this an annual event, improving it each year as the idea grows and more schools become interested.

## APRIL WEATHER FAVORED FARMERS

Both February and March were mild, open months in practically all parts of the country, and April has followed an as shown by U. S. weather bureau records from all states. The temperature for the month was above normal everywhere, except at a few points in the extreme southeastern and far western parts of the country. It was especially warm in the interior valley states where the excess of temperature above normal ranged from 6 degrees to 10 degrees. During the latter part of the month summer temperatures prevailed over the eastern half of the country, with maxima ranging from 90 degrees to 95 degrees quite generally from the Ohio river southward.

The persistently mild weather for the past three months has been remarkable and very seldom equalled as to scope and duration within the climatological history of the country. There were, of course, a few cold or cool periods, which always occur even in the warmest of winters and springs. The month had less than the usual amount of precipitation in nearly all regions east of the Rocky mountains, though there was an excess in the southern great plains and a few localities elsewhere.

As a result of the continued warmth both vegetation and farm work advanced rapidly for the season and were considerably ahead of the average year, except in the southwest where the soil was too dry for germination and for growth. There was some frost damage to fruit and tender vegetation in limited areas, but harm was not extensive notwithstanding the dangerously early date of fruit blooming.

The month, on the whole, was favorable for winter and spring grains in the interior and central northern states. The seeding of oats and spring wheat was largely completed and germination was satisfactory. Winter wheat harvested steadily, especially in the western portion of the winter wheat belt, where rainfall was of great benefit. Considerable corn was planted the latter part of the month in the central valley states, and early cotton planting had progressed at the close to the northern parts of the cotton belt. Early-planted corn and cotton germinated satisfactorily, except in the dry areas, principally in the southwest; the drought was broken near the close of the month in much of this area, which materially improved the outlook.

In the southeast during the latter part of the month late seeded crops needed showers for the best germination, but the early-seeded were generally doing well. In the great western range region grazing interests had variable weather quite generally from the central and northern great plains westward, but severe drought prevailed in the south, especially in the southern border states, where a large portion of the range was poor and in many places bare, with considerable loss of livestock.
