**FLIGHT POSTPONED**

WASHINGTON, May 11.—War department officials already are considering the possibility that the recent joint maneuvers in Hawaiian waters will necessitate establishment of priority of assignment of modern planes, soon to be ordered for the army air service, to Hawaiian and other overseas defenses.

**CLEAN-UP STARTS TODAY; MAYOR ASKS FULL CO-OPERATION**

Mayor George E. Houck today urged the cooperation of all residents of the city in the clean-up campaign which is on today. Today and Tuesday have been set aside as the annual clean-up dates, and all residents of the city are urged to put out all of the incumbrances and accumulations of the winter months, and the city will provide for hauling them away without charge. Cans, bottles, and other refuse, which cannot be burned, should be placed in sacks, boxes or other secure containers, and placed out near the curb line on paved streets. During the remainder of the week teams and trucks will be used to haul away the rubbish which is placed out in accordance with the rules. Unless the containers are placed out by Tuesday night, a charge will be made for hauling.

Mayor Houck urges that this clean-up be not confined to hauling away rubbish. It is his desire that all residents of the city cooperate in improving the appearance of the property by cutting down the tall grass and weeds in back yards and elsewhere, and that their property be made to appear as well as possible. The strawberry carnival is to be held within a short time, and it is the desire to have the city looking attractive, neat and clean.

**HOOD RIVER HAS HEAVY FIRE LOSS**

HOOD RIVER, Ore., May 11.—Hood River suffered the most severe fire loss in its history Sunday morning when the big plant of the Hood River Apple Vinegar Company and the warehouse of Kelly Brothers, merchants and apple dealers, burned. The estimate of the combined loss was placed at approximately \$750,000, the vinegar plant's damage estimated at \$150,000.

The origin of the fire, which apparently started in the boiler room was not determined. George Carlton, night watchman and boiler man, stated that he had started a fire in the boilers about four o'clock. Shortly before six residents saw the smoke and flames. The fire had gained such headway when the fire department arrived that all efforts of bringing it under control were fruitless.

While C. J. Calkins, founder and manager of the vinegar plant said he thought the plant would probably be rebuilt on more modern lines, he declined to make any definite statement.

Kelly Brothers, whose warehouse was a three story wooden structure, will be replaced at once with a more modern plant.

**LOVE TANGLE ENDS IN DEATH**

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 11.—Andrew Neilson shot to death Mrs. Ogle Wick in the Regent Hotel here last night and then committed suicide. Police reported.

Both persons were from Seattle. The slayings were the outcome of a love tangle in which five Seattle men and women were involved, the police said.

Mrs. John F. Loughren declared that Neilson telephoned her yesterday morning at Seattle that her husband had gone to Vancouver with Mrs. Mable Meyer. She agreed, she said, to drive to Vancouver with Neilson to confirm his statement.

Arriving here the couple went to the Regent Hotel and knocked on the door of a room which Loughren opened. Mrs. Wick was in the room, Mrs. Loughren said. Neilson entered and Loughren came out of the apartment leaving Mrs. Wick and Neilson alone. Shots followed. Mrs. Loughren related, and police found the couple dead. At the sound of the firing Mrs. Meyer came running from another room. No one saw the shooting, the police said.

It was alleged that Loughren registered Mrs. Meyer as his wife at the hotel. Mr. and Mrs. Loughren and Mrs. Meyer are to be held pending an inquiry.

**MICHIGAN LEAGUE REFUSED A BRIBE**

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The public school defense league of Detroit, Michigan, today was refused permission by the supreme court to file a brief in the Oregon case, involving the right of states to compel children to attend public schools. Chief Justice Taft pointed out that the case having been argued it would be impossible under the rules to receive the brief.

**MAY PARDON MURDERER**

SALEM, Ore., May 11.—Governor Pierce has made known that he is considering application for a pardon for A. J. Weston, who is serving a life sentence for the murder of Robert Krug, who lived near Slaters, Deschutes county. Weston was twice tried and convicted on a charge of murdering Krug in Deschutes county, but these verdicts were reversed by the state supreme court in opinion written by Justice Brown. The third trial was held in Wasco county. No appeal from Weston's third conviction has been taken.

**RAINFALL WAS HEAVY**

EUGENE, Ore., May 11.—Rain-fall here yesterday was the heaviest of any May day since 1912, according to Gerard De Broekert, weather observer. A total precipitation of .83 of an inch was recorded.

On May 10, 1911, a total precipitation of .94 of an inch was recorded, and on May 18, 1912, it was .25 of an inch.

The downpour was augmented by a thundershower in the late afternoon.

**ARCHDEACON BARR G. LEE INJURED IN AUTO WRECK**  
The Rev. Barr G. Lee, archdeacon of the Diocese of Sacramento, formerly of Roseburg, was painfully injured in a motor collision on the highway on April 14, according to word received here today. Returning with Mrs. Lee from a missionary trip in the evening, his car skidded across the highway owing to a wet pavement. Stepping outside to warn passing motorists by flashlight until he could regain the road, the archdeacon was run down by a truck and thrown to the ground, breaking two ribs and the pelvis bone. Mrs. Lee was also injured as the coupe was overturned. It will be several weeks before the archdeacon is able to resume his duties.
