WANT CHAS. HUGHES TO FIGHT WILL HAYS—MILWAUKEE, May 12.—The name of Charles Evan Hughes, former secretary of state was mentioned here today as the one who would successfully guide the destinies of the Independent Motion Picture Producers, exhibitors and exchanges men in their declared fight against what they termed the "film trust."

The Independent Picture Producers and the Motion Picture Theater Owners Association, opened a three day convention this afternoon after declaring war on Will Hays, asserting that he does not represent the entire industry but in reality only the "big three" the Metro-Goldwyn, the Associated First National and the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation.

Announcement was made that a fund of \$75,000 has been raised to carry on the fight against the "alleged film trust."

Michael J. O'Toole, president of the Motion Picture Theater Owners Association declared, that "on the outcome of this committee rests the future of the motion picture industry of America."

MISS POPE TO TESTIFY (Associated Press Local Wire.) CHICAGO, May 12.—Miss Isabelle Pope, dance of the late William N. McClintock, orphan millionaire, for whose death his foster father, William D. Shepherd is charged with murder by lynch mob incitation, today was on her way to Chicago to testify in the trial of Shepherd, set for next Monday.

Miss Pope boarded a train in Oregon, according to her attorney, and is expected to be an important witness. She went to California soon after the investigation into her father's death last December.

She had obtained a marriage license and was ready to marry young McClintock as he lay ill and testified that Shepherd previously had told her she alone could not obtain the license and that "Billy" did not want to marry until he was better or recovered.
