### JEALOUS WIFE ADMITS DYNAMITING SHACK WHERE HUSBAND MET DEATH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
COEUR D'ALENE, Ida., May 12.—A charge of first degree murder was filed today against Mrs. R. J. Miles, who has confessed to dynamiting a shack in the rear of her home here, in which her husband was asleep Sunday night. Miles died soon afterward.  
In a newspaper statement today Mrs. Miles declared she bought the dynamite with the intention of blowing up the shack to prevent her husband taking it away to go with another woman. She said she found a note from a woman to her husband Sunday evening and that this had caused her to set off the explosive. She lit the fuse, she said, and she stood by until just before the explosion.  
Mrs. Herman Walters, a neighbor said yesterday she had written notes to Miles with the intention that Mrs. Miles should find them because she had evidenced jealousy of their friendship.

### WOMAN CLAIMS TO BE UNDIVORCED WIFE OF MAN KILLED IN ACCIDENT

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 12.—A fight for the estate of Mr. and Mrs. John Chapman of this city, killed at Cloverdale, B. C., Thursday, when their car went into a ditch on their way to attend the Tulip festival at Hollingham, Wash., was in progress here today. Mrs. John Chapman, Glace Bay, N. S., sent word to a lawyer that she was married to Chapman and never divorced from him, but that he left her and a small daughter, when he emigrated at Glace Bay early in the war. Mrs. Chapman wrote that her husband was discharged at Halifax, N. S., in 1918 and wrote her she would never see him again. Mrs. May Landry of Portland, Ore., a sister of the Glace Bay wife, was in Vancouver visiting a daughter and read of the tragedy in a newspaper. She identified Chapman's body.

### GOVERNMENT RECLAMATION POLICY APPROVED

SPOKANE, Wash., May 12.—While no formal action was taken on the matter, decisive lack of information concerning its specific provisions, members of the board of trustees of the Columbia Basin Irrigation League, meeting here today, indicated their approval of the government's reclamation policy. It was emphasized, however, that the policy adopted should be broad enough to cover all reclamation projects, large as well as small.  
J. M. Kyle of Stanfield, Ore., was instructed to confer with Secretary of Agriculture Jardine in an effort to arrange for him to visit the Columbia basin on his forthcoming western trip and present for the visit of Senator Charles McNary of Oregon and Representative Addison T. Smith of Idaho were considered.

### MOROCCAN FIGHTING IS STILL ON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
PARIS, May 12.—A censorship has been established on press dispatches of French and foreign agencies and newspaper dealing with the Moroccan operations, it was announced today.  
PARIS, May 12.—France is asking Spain for authority to bombard or attack the concentrations in Spanish Morocco of the Rifian tribesmen now engaged in an invasion of the French zone. The Spanish are further asked to stop the provisioning of Abd-el-Krim, the Rifian leader, through the fort of Agadir.  
These requests are being made in the form of "conversations," although there is no great confidence here in the results to be expected. The French feel that they are entitled to some help from Spain in the present situation as they say they are placed at a great disadvantage in repelling the Rifian invasion through the ability of the tribesmen to make all preparations for attack while safely on the Spanish side of the border.

### TANGIER, MAY 12.—A report to the Havas agency says a German submarine recently landed explosives, telephonic material and foodstuffs on the coast of Rif, the chief town of which, Abd-el-Krim, is invading the French zone of Morocco. It is also stated that several Germans, dressed as Rifians and using Oriental pseudonyms, have been observed on the Rif.

### MOROCCAN, PARIS, MAY 12.—Abd-el-Krim continues to consolidate the positions held by his Rifian tribesmen in Northern French Morocco, notably in the regions of Djebel Bibane and Kirfane and the task of reinvigorating the French advance posts is effected only in the teeth of growing resistance.

### ACCORDING TO REPORTS THROUGH NATIVE CHANNELS STILL LARGER FORCES ARE BEING GATHERED IN OTHER PARTS OF THE RIF TO REINFORCE THE WESTERN PART OF THE INVADER'S FRONT.

French reinforcements, however, are arriving faster than the Rifians and when Abd-el-Krim launches his offensive, military men say he will find the French well prepared to deal with him.  
Native Moroccan troops under French officers were used yesterday in a forward movement looking to consolidation of the French front opposite Abd-el-Krim's concentrations. The objective was reached without an engagement, according to official reports.  
The French air service has been able to get a general idea of the Rifian concentrations, but respect for Spanish territory has prevented them from bombing these

### CIRCUIT COURT TO START BUSY TERM ON MAY 25

The circuit court term, which starts on May 25, is expected to be a busy term, according to Judge J. W. Hamilton. There are a number of important cases to be heard, and although there will not be any great number of criminal cases, there will be a number of civil actions and like matters, which will demand the attention of the court, keeping the jury busy for considerable time. The grand jury is to meet on Monday, the 18th and will investigate the cases which have been held over for its consideration. District Attorney Cordon reports that the grand jury has a light docket, and that its work should not take long. Its most important case is the disposal of the charge of robbery, attacking an officer, and jail breaking against Lee Driscan.  
The court is busy now hearing motions, demurrers, and other preliminary matters leading up to the point of getting civil cases at issue. The docket is to be called on Saturday, at which time the cases now ready for trial will be placed upon the court calendar.
