Every state in the Union is well represented in the observance of Better Homes Week—May 11th to 17th—this year, as was the case last year. However, the number of communities taking part is many hundred beyond the number participating last year.

In many communities homes furnished and decorated especially for the purpose will be shown to the public to demonstrate the best that the various communities have to offer as homes for families of moderate income.

This national educational movement has the cordial cooperation of many branches of the federal government and of men. The President of the United States and his immediate predecessor in that high office have taken a deep interest in the movement.

The chairmen of the local committees throughout the country have been appointed by Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, who is president of Better Homes in America.

There is ample evidence that this year's Better Homes campaign will far surpass even the excellent results achieved in former years through the efforts of the men and women who have volunteered their time and their services for the benefit of their communities.

FARM ORGANIZATIONS PLAN TO CO-OPERATE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

DES MOINES, May 13.—An agricultural committee authorized to develop methods of bringing about joint action of all farm organizations with respect to legislative measures was formed today by more than 300 delegates to the farm conference representing the recognized agricultural organizations of the country.

In authorizing the committee the conference provided a unified agriculture program to which the various farm bureaus, farmers unions, granges, co-operative and agricultural societies represented agreed to subscribe.

The conference recognized the necessity of organization to regulate and control the marketing of farm products.

The principle of co-operative marketing with the farmers in control of their own marketing machinery initiating such terminal facilities as may be necessary, also was enforced.

SHEPHERD'S WIFE NOT ACCOMPLICE IN MURDER CASE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

CHICAGO, May 14.—Mrs. William D. Shepherd has been cleared by the grand jury of implication in the death of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock and William McClintock, millionaire orphan.

The jury voted two "no bills" thus quashing findings of a coroner's jury that held her as accessory to her husband, held for trial on an indictment charging the murder by typhoid fever of young McClintock. It took no action on the coroner's jury verdict holding Shepherd responsible for Mrs. McClintock's death, but may there hear any further evidence developed in that regard.

Mrs. Shepherd greeted the jury's vote with a statement in which she said an acquittal "must be the ultimate outcome of all the conspiracy against my husband and myself. There must be an end to this damnable outrage against us."

She has maintained throughout that the investigation of the deaths and the charges against her husband and herself was a conspiracy.
