MURDERED BOY'S FIANCEE TO AID SHEPHERD CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—Miss Isabella Pope, fiancee of the late William Nelson McClintock, Chicago "millionaire orphan" passed through Portland today enroute to Chicago from Grants Pass, Ore., where she has been visiting relatives.

She said she had not been subpoenaed but was hastening back to Chicago on the call of her lawyer to be ready to testify in the case against William D. Shepherd, who is to be tried in Chicago in connection with the death of McClintock.

While declaring she must not talk of the case in advance of testimony she may give on the stand, she volunteered a few observations.

She declared she was as much surprised as anyone at the rapid developments following the death of McClintock.

"I personally could not understand why the Shepherds made such a quick get away after the burial of William," she said. "His illness had not been half as hard on them as on me, though they did say they were all broken up, and had to get away for a rest."

VETERAN FAINTS DURING TRIAL TO PROVE WHO HE IS

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., May 14.—Collapse of Arthur Lopez-Frazier on the witness stand late today temporarily halted the federal court trial here in which he seeks to establish himself as Arthur Frazier, a war veteran who the war department claims was killed in service.

Lopez-Frazier had been on the stand an hour and while under cross-examination he suddenly slumped forward in his chair and fainted. Relatives of the real Arthur Frazier wept as they watched attorneys carry from the room the young man who claim they are supporting.

The plaintiff claims his name is Arthur Frazier. He claims he enlisted in the United States army April 4, 1917, and that he is entitled to the benefit of a certain insurance policy for \$10,000 which it is admitted that Frazier should be entitled to. The principal question is the identity of the plaintiff, whether he is the soldier who enlisted and is entitled to the benefit of the insurance policy.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 15.—Judge James A. Collins, in criminal court today, overruled a motion to quash an indictment charging J. C. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, with the murder of Madge Overhaizer of Indianapolis.

Earl Glinck and Earl Gentry are charged with murder in the same indictment.

Following the decision the three defendants waived arraignment and personally entered pleas of not guilty. Trial was set by agreement to begin June 2.

GOVERNMENT LOSES SUIT AGAINST LUMBER FIRMS

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Dismissal of complaints against five western lumber companies was announced last night by the federal trade commission. The complaints naming the Coeur D'Alene Mill Company, Coeur D'Alene, Idaho; Grande Ronde Lumber Company, Perry, Ore.; McGoldrick Lumber Company, Spokane, Wash.; Deer Park Lumber Company, Deer Park, Wash.; and Shovel-Hoon Company, Bend, Ore., had charged the companies with selling western pine as western white pine. The complaints were dismissed on the grounds that before they were served on the respondents, the practice complained of had been discontinued.

IRELAND AGAIN RESTLESS
