KLAMATH FALLS MAYOR REFUSES TO BOTTLE CITY

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 15.—For the second time within a month Mayor Fred B. Goddard yesterday vetoed a councilmanic resolution which sought to give the Strahorn railroad an exclusive franchise to cross Sixth Street. The mayor declared that he would never sign a resolution which would tend to permit one railroad to "bottle up" the entrance to the city. He also urged the city not to give the Strahorn line any permits or easements of any kind until the city's \$300,000 interest in the road should be protected against a "bankruptcy sale" or any other sale of the Strahorn road. Comced with this executive veto, it became known that Hill line surveyors are planning to locate a line across upper Klamath Lake, which would put the new road nearly four miles from Klamath Falls if such a route were taken. It is believed here that this line is being surveyed to protect the Hill lines in the event that Klamath Falls does not give it a feasible entry into the city.

TO QUIZ GOVERNORS ON NATIONAL DEFENSE DAY

WASHINGTON, May 14.—A concerted movement was in progress today to have state executives place before President Coolidge their views regarding the proposed "national defense muster" on Armistice Day. The president before reaching a decision on the plan, drawn by a committee of reserve officers association and submitted by the war department, desires to know the attitude of the governors. With a view of expediting the matter, appeals for prompt consideration were being sent to state capitols by the reserve, national guard and veterans organizations.

EARTHQUAKE SOMEWHERE LASTED NEARLY AN HOUR

WASHINGTON, May 15.—An earthquake of moderate intensity was recorded today on the seismograph at Georgetown University. It began at 7:07 and lasted until about 8 a. m., and Director Tondorf placed the distance at 4,500 miles from Washington with the direction not definitely determined.

NEW YORK, May 15.—An earthquake of moderate intensity was recorded this morning on the seismograph at Fordham University. The first shock was registered at 7:07 standard time and the greatest disturbance at 7:15 o'clock. It was estimated the disturbance was 4,600 miles away.

TRAIN BANDITS ARE CONVICTED AFTER A LONG COURT FIGHT

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WAUKEGAN, Ill., May 15.—Bernhardt Mylin, Waukegan, and Edward J. Smith, Milwaukee, were sentenced to 25 years imprisonment and Bernard Smith and Ralph McKee, Chicago, were acquitted today by the jury trying them for the murder of Russell Sage Dickey, express messenger, in an attempted holdup of the Viking, Chicago and Northwestern Railway Express. The jury deliberated nearly 12 hours before agreeing.

The prosecution had asked for death penalties for Mylin, who fired the shot that killed Dickey, and Edward Smith, and asked for a life sentence for Bernard Smith, former Chicago policeman, and a 25-year sentence for McKee, alleged go-between.

The defense maintained throughout that the shooting was accidental and that the accused thought the express messenger would assist them in plans to rob the press car of a money shipment of more than \$100,000.

FALLING AIRPLANE MANGLES, BURNS ITS THREE OCCUPANTS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

TRENTON, Neb., May 15.—Efforts were being made early today to locate Mrs. Lloyd L. Heffling, wife of a commercial aviator of San Francisco, who, with two other persons, was crushed and burned to death late yesterday when the plane in which they were riding crashed to the ground near here and burst into flames.

Mrs. Heffling is said to be on her way to the coast in an automobile and is thought to be west of Salt Lake City. Heffling and his two passengers, Mrs. Harry Gibson, 35, of McCook, Neb., and Floyd Ekins, of Culbertson, Neb., were riding in the former's machine and had gone but a few miles when a wing of the plane collapsed causing the craft to go into a tail spin and carry its occupants to their death 2500 feet below. All three of the plane's occupants were burned and mangled almost beyond recognition when spectators reached them.

Ekins, an automobile salesman, is survived by a widow and three children. Mrs. Gibson, the wife of a Chicago, Burlington and Quincy locomotive fireman, was here taking care of her aged father who is gravely ill. Besides her husband and father she is survived by three small children.

The county attorney was notified of the accident and ordered that the bodies of the victims be held in a local undertaking establishment pending an investigation.

BARS AFFIDAVIT HURTFUL TO CASE OF EX-GOV. DAVIS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

OPERA, Kans., May 14.—Affidavits signed by C. H. Bartholomew, Wichita furniture dealer, stating that former Governor Jonathan M. Davis pardoned his son, Ernest Bartholomew, after Volney Johnson had taken \$500 to the office of Carl J. Peterson, former bank commissioner, were barred from the testimony today in the Davis trial on a charge of soliciting a bribe. Davis is charged with conspiring with Peterson to add to money for a pardon.

In rebutting the evidence, Judge James A. McClure declared: "Volney Johnson, if he were here, could testify that he had taken money to Mr. Peterson from Mr. Bartholomew. But it is too remote for Mr. Bartholomew to show that he had given money to Volney Johnson, who went to Peterson's office and that Governor Davis immediately changed his attitude and granted a pardon to Mr. Bartholomew's son."

"I don't believe the circumstances of money being given Volney Johnson, coupled with the circumstances of a changed attitude on the governor's part would be competent to show the governor's intent."

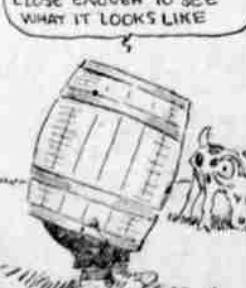
