SEPARATE ARMS CONGRESS PLAN TURNED DOWN

League Opposed to Idea But Not to a Bureau Under Its Control.

U. S. ACCEPTS VOTE

Washington Awaits Reply to War Debt Reminder Expecting France to Act First.

GENEVA, May 18.—The crisis in the international conference for the control of traffic in arms and munitions which has been created by America's refusal to have the League of Nations' council appoint the central office for arms control was averted today by a decision to abandon the plan to establish the proposed central bureau.

Representative Theodore E. Burton of Ohio, head of the American delegation, addressing a special committee in charge of the question, insisted that the central bureau should not be connected with the league. Virtually all of the other ten countries represented on the committee adhered to the idea that no central international bureau should be established unless it is placed under league jurisdiction. Confronting this impenetrable wall the committee decided the conciliatory thing to do was to make progress by marching around it. Therefore on motion of M. Lange, of Norway, the committee unanimously resolved in its judgment the central office or bureau in the form previously proposed is not impossible and that the same can be attained by allowing each government to publish arms statistics.

Practical effect of today's action is that the League of Nations nevertheless will collect all data regarding arms and the result will be the same as if a central

office had been created under the league.

American susceptibilities, however, are satisfied and league members remain loyal to the league by declining to agree to the organization of any bureau outside the league and by adhering to the stipulation of the league covenant that all its international bureaus be operated under the league.

Debtor Nations Due To Reply.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The Washington government is awaiting with interest some word of the reception accorded in the nine European debtor nations to the news that this country desires to arrange funding settlements without undue delay. Meanwhile there is speculation as to which will be the first to submit a proposal.

France, whose debt to the United States is the largest of the lot, is regarded as the hub of the situation, and it is known that officials would welcome an opening move from that quarter.

If the means of conveying this government's desires to the foreign capitals have been varied they have lacked nothing in force and definiteness. In every case the debtor nation has been given to understand in an unmistakable way that Washington believes pending arrangements should not be further delayed. In view of that fact, the statement of the French foreign officers that "no note" on the subject has been received from Washington is regarded here as merely the stock diplomatic denial, based on a technicality.

In any case, there remains no misapprehension in Paris as to the views of Washington and officials here are gratified that by the creation of a committee to consider the subject, France has at least made a beginning toward the end desired.

Uncle Sam's Man Expected by France (at Paris); Money Experts Get Busy.

PARIS, May 18.—The action of the United States in requesting funding proposals from its European debtors was foreseen in France and answered in advance. It is said in official circles, by the ministerial declaration made after the cabinet meeting last Saturday. This was to the effect that Finance Minister Caillaux and Foreign Minister Briand had been charged with the task of studying the inter-allied debt question with a view to its settlement.

The Quai d'Orsay received a cablegram from M. Daeschner, the French ambassador in Washington, on Saturday giving full particulars of the American decision, but this is said to have contained no information that might cause the French government to precipitate negotiations or a joint group meeting of two experts, both financial and political, from the ministries of finance and foreign affairs.

The foreign office says it has no knowledge of any note coming from Washington.

The Temps said today it understands a definite proposal will be made within 15 days by the French government to the United States and Great Britain for the settlement of war debts.

Germany Satisfied With Dawes.

America's request for settlement of the war debts is ignored with striking unanimity by the principal morning newspapers, but excelsior leads a few of the smaller political organs in criticizing the Washington government for presenting its bill "when France is floundering in a grave financial crisis."

and Will Adhere to It.

BERLIN, May 18.—Foreign Minister Brüning, announced today to the Reichstag that the German government will continue to carry out the Dawes plan.

Minister Stresemann said no country welcomed more than Germany the efforts of the Dawes plan to accomplish the economic pacification of Europe.

He said that even those who opposed the acceptance of the Dawes plan were convinced that without it Germany would not have been able to establish its currency on a secure basis and would be obliged to wage a bitter struggle for her economic existence.

Heir Stresemann said, "we shall continue to carry out the Dawes plan in the same manner as we have heretofore. Parliamentary majorities and governments may change, but I cannot conceive any administration which would depart from the program and policies we have adopted."

He said Germany's relations with the United States are most satisfactory and all signs indicate that in the United States a genuine understanding of Germany's needs are increasing.

Italian Statesman Pleads Equity Basis for Settlement.

ROME, May 18.—Italy's position in the settlement of her war debts, Tommaso Tittoni, president of the senate and ex-foreign minister, declared yesterday in a speech at Vittorio.

Signor Tittoni pointed out that Austria owes Italy heavy debts for war reparations and expenses

of occupation, but that Italy has received no payment whatever. He quoted statements of some Englishmen and Americans to the effect that the cancellation of inter-allied debts would be chiefly advantageous to England and America themselves, because it would accelerate Europe's purchasing power and increase England's and America's exports.

He declared that Italy has every confidence in the feelings of justice and equity which inspired her creditors. A message was read from Premier Mussolini expressing agreement with Tittoni's views.

Signor Tittoni also pointed out that the money borrowed by Italy during the war from England and America was spent entirely in those countries for necessary war materials. Thus, he said, Italy's borrowings had gone to increase the profits of England and America.

He asked if these profits should not be balanced off in an equitable accounting.

"Indeed, America and England in loaning money to Italy, were really investing their own capital at home," he said.

He added that Italy must trust the sentiment of equity of these great nations whose acute business sense has never dampened their passion for justice nor their constant sympathy and friendship for Italy.

He urged his country to make no more foreign loans.
