## PAVING OF ROAD TO DIXONVILLE BEING PLANNED

### Consolidation of Road Districts to Provide Funds Is Method Suggested.

### WOULD RAISE \$42,000

### Money Would Be Sufficient to Surface Two Miles 16 Feet Wide or Nearly 4 Miles 8 Feet

Plans for the formation of a consolidated road district, including all of the districts east of Roseburg, for the purpose of paving the road leading east to Dixonville, using special tax and market road money, is being widely discussed, and may result in such action being taken this year.

The districts to be included in this consolidation are as follows: Road district Number 2, which is the Glendale district, having a valuation of \$569,888. Road district 32, which is the Dixonville district, having a valuation of \$388,140. Road district 33, which is the Lindbloom district, having a valuation, \$167,610. Road district 35, which is the Lindbloom district, having a valuation, \$167,610. Road district 36, which is the Peck district, having a valuation of \$281,270. Road district 39, which is the South Deer Creek district, having a valuation of \$267,520. Road district 47, which is the Jim Short district, or Sunshine road, having a valuation of \$97,430. Road district 48, which is the Hill Singleton district, having a valuation of \$104,110. Road district 71, which is the North Umpqua, or Rock Creek district, having a valuation of \$268,510. The total valuation of the consolidated district would be \$2,084,870, which with a levy of a ten-mill tax would give over \$20,000 special tax each year.

Under the law the county court would be required to match the funds of such a consolidated district with market road money, which would give approximately \$2,000 each year, enough money to pave nearly two miles with 16 foot wide concrete each year, according to estimates of County Roadmaster Frear.

Mr. Frear suggests that the paving be done along the same line as at Glendale where one half width pavement was laid, giving a strip 8 feet in width. Mr. Frear suggests that this pavement be laid on the right hand side of the road coming towards Roseburg, which would give the farmer coming to market with his produce a paved road all the way. This road could also be used by outgoing traffic, but traffic from the city would be forced to turn out for the farmer coming in, giving the load right of way. This scheme works out very well at Glendale, Mr. Frear states.

By laying this one-half strip of pavement, it would be possible to pave the road for a distance of between 2 1/2 and 4 miles the first year. The second year the road could be widened to the full 16 feet, or another 8 foot strip laid, just as desired.

The plan will probably be taken up with the growers and taxpayers residing within the affected districts, and if the plan meets with general approval, petitions will be prepared for signatures. The project would then come before a meeting on the third Monday of next November, as provided by law, but in the meantime plans and specifications could be prepared by the roadmaster so that definite figures could be submitted.

This plan is the one favored by the county court, and which will probably be the ultimate outcome. The Roseburg-Dixonville road is one of the most important market roads within the county, being tributary to some of the leading agricultural sections of the Umpqua Valley. Naturally with so much traffic the upkeep cost is tremendous. The law prevents the county court from spending market road money on anything other than permanent improvements, so that the maintenance money only the funds paid in on regular or special road taxes can be used. This year the court was fortunate enough to obtain the use of \$15,000 of market road money for straightening and doing other work on this road, which will probably put it in good condition. The court intends to use this money in such a way that the road will be put in condition for paving.

At Glendale the pavement was laid on the old road bed, so that

there was a good sub grade, and the rolling and grading costs amounted to only about \$800 per mile.

Unless pavement is laid on this road, it is feared that funds in the future will be insufficient to keep up the maintenance. The court desires that the more important market roads, such as the Edenbower road to Garden Valley, the Melrose road, and the Dixonville road, may eventually be paved, so that the cost of maintenance will be reduced and at the same time substantial and permanent roads created.

### GASTON B. MEANS ASKS PERMISSION TO ENTER PRISON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, May 19.—Gaston B. Means, a storm center in the Daugherty investigation and outstanding figure in many court actions, surrendered in the District of Columbia Supreme Court today and requested that he be allowed to begin a two-year prison term immediately.

Means was convicted on a conspiracy charge in New York. He was also indicted in connection with forgers in connection with the handling of papers in the Daugherty investigation. Defense attorneys yesterday asked that his trial here be postponed while he asked a stay of the mandate of the New York courts. The mandate reached here today, however, and Means at once asked that he be sent direct to the Atlanta penitentiary without the necessity of having to return to New York.

District Attorney Gordon referred the question to the department of justice which will decide whether Means must be tried here at once on the forgers' charge, in which it is alleged the name of his former brother-in-law of the Daugherty committee was unlawfully used.

### GOVERNMENT SUIT HELD UNNECESSARY

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 19.—Holding that the 1918 decision dissolving the International Harvester Company had proven effective, a special federal court of equity, today denied the government's petition for supplemental provisions to that decree.

The government sought supplemental provisions to the federal court decision of November 2, 1918, contending that these additional publications were necessary to carry out the intention of the decision. The supplemental action was filed July 17, 1923. Evidence presented by the government, the decision filed today said, "not only fails to prove that since the re-organization decree the company has been unduly or unreasonably monopolizing or restraining interstate commerce in harvesting machinery or appliances in the United States, but in our opinion, conclusively proves it has not done and is not doing so. The government will appeal to the supreme court from the decision.
