OAKLAND GOBBLERS TO ATTEND CARNIVAL IN BODY SATURDAY

The Oakland Gobblers announced today that they intend to invade the city 100 per cent strong on Saturday, and will be accompanied by a great delegation of Oakland business and professional men and women, who will participate in the grange and industrial parade.

An agreement was circulated in Oakland last night, and was signed by 55 business houses, agreeing to close the doors of their establishments between 9 and 12 a. m. on Saturday and to attend the carnival in a body.

The Gobblers, Oakland's well known booster organization, will wear their caps and, obviously, and will enter a beautifully decorated float in the parade. A meeting is to be held on Friday night, at which time plans will be perfected and all details will be arranged.

"The Gobblers and Oakland people are anxious to show in some way their co-operation and support in the Roseburg Strawberry Carnival," stated A. L. Malory, secretary of the Oakland booster club this morning. "We greatly appreciate the help and co-operation given us by Roseburg in our annual Independence Day celebration and it is our hope to be able in some way to

aid in making the strawberry carnival a big success. Our people were unanimous in their agreement to close on Saturday and to attend the carnival, and Oakland expects to take Roseburg by storm on that day."

ADJUSTMENT OF SCHOOL ISSUES EXPECTED SOON

C. A. Brand Says Amiable Settlement of Duplication Charge Coming.

PUBLICITY REGRETTED

Oregon Has Largest Percentage of Young People in College of Any State in Union.

A fair and mutually satisfactory adjustment of the matters at issue between the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural College is in sight according to Chas. A. Brand, a member of the State Board of Higher Curricula, who returned this morning from Portland where the board has been meeting to investigate charges of duplication of work in the State University and Oregon Agricultural College. The board of Higher Curricula, which by act of the legislature is the body having final authority in passing upon the courses of study at the two institutions, and which is required by statute "to prevent unnecessary duplications" of work, has been in session this week, and while no rulings have been made it can be said that questions at issue are in a fair way to amicable settlement. Mr. Brand says:

"The facilities, regents and alumni of both institutions have shown a fine spirit of fairness in the hearings held and all seem to regret the large amount of publicity which has exaggerated the seriousness of the situation.

"These technical questions of courses of study can hardly be successfully tried out in the newspapers which seem to have radiated more heat than light in the present discussion," said Mr. Brand.

"Oregon has reason to be proud of both of the great institutions of learning, and of the fact that Oregon's percentage of young people going to college is larger than that of any other state in the union. Both institutions are ambitious to make themselves the most efficient and best possible, and it is from this very commendable earnestness in developing these institutions that the trouble now comes. In a state with our small population we cannot afford and do not need two complete universities located only 40 miles apart. Some lines of work must be stressed at one, some lines at the other, and some things, such as home economics, music and the basic arts and sciences must be duplicated to some extent in both institutions. To what extent it is not always easy to say.

"The public should understand that our Board does not exist to prevent all duplications, but to prevent 'unnecessary duplications' which is a very different thing, and one in which every Oregon taxpayer is interested.

"You may say that neither institution has the slightest desire to cripple the work of the other, and that the Board of Higher Curricula, which represents the people of the state, would not permit it if it had. Other meetings of the Board will be held soon, and announcements will be made which I think will show the two institutions in closer and more cordial co-operation than ever before."

NAVY MAN VISITS

Mr. George L. Troyer, Chief Quartermaster, U. S. Navy, will be in Roseburg May 21st and 22nd.

During Troyer's service in the navy he has had some very remarkable experiences in various parts of the world. Before the war he was in China doing duty on a gun boat on the Yangtze River. The navy maintains ships many miles up this river to protect the missionaries and American business interests. During the period on this river he was at one time 1500 miles in the interior of China, a place seldom reached by a white man. When the World War broke out he was sent to Europe on one of our latest submarines and saw active duty in the Mediterranean waters. This submarine duty was considered by our government one of the most hazardous and at the same time, useful duties of any performed by our naval vessels. His thrilling experiences of fights with German submarines is a romance in itself. Troyer originally enlisted in the navy at Portland, where he is now performing duty at the naval recruiting station. He will be very glad to give any information regarding the naval service to any who are interested. While in Roseburg, Troyer will be at the Grand Hotel.
